President's Remarks

One hundred thirteen years ago, the first Rotary meeting was held by the four founders. No minutes were kept, no announcements and no committee reports made, no speakers or nametags, and it's unlikely anyone talked about service. As a matter of fact, the club did not begin focusing on the needs of the community for another few years. In other words, the meeting would have failed today's usual standards for productive Rotary meeting most resoundingly. However, it was of course, the most productive Rotary meeting ever held!

In the 113 years since that first meeting, Rotary has become far larger, and more diverse, than those four founding members could have conceived. And in all certainty Rotary will look very different again in another 113 years. That is, if the organization is willing and capable of adapting to the every changing environment it is operating in. Most of that responsibility falls on the shoulders of the Council on Legislation members who meet every three years to review and vote on proposed changes to the legislation that governs Rotary. The last meeting in 2016 may well be remembered as one of the most progressive in recent Rotary history.

Among other things, Council granted clubs more freedom in determining their meeting schedule and membership. To quote past RI president John Germ: "Our clubs have always been organized around a meal. Lunch and dinner were part of our dues, and that system served us well. But society has changed."

Last Week: David Lockett LifePlan Coaching Program Update

LifePlan Coaching for Youth in Conflict with the Law. Coaching is not counselling or therapy – it's a specific conversational process about facilitating change from the client's current state to their desired state. The coaching process fosters self-directed learning and is grounded in self-assessment and recognition of personal values and strengths.

Total cost to deliver the LPC program to 250 youth: \$1.25 million (a net savings of \$248.75 million) And remember, the costs to the system and society of just one of these habitual young offenders over their lifetime is at least \$2 million!!!

This past August, we wrapped up our very successful first year of the PACT LifePlan Coaching program for high-risk, repeat offender youth in Belleville, Ontario. In partnership with the youth courts, the idea behind this program is to break the cycle of criminal behavior in the highest-risk youth before they get caught for life in the adult criminal justice system.

I want to give a special shout out to our life coach Will Manos and Toronto manager Catalina Chaux for doing a fantastic job. Also to Ben Marshall, for his commitment to develop and support the Belleville LifePlan Coaching Program.

PACT is highly committed to building an integrated best practice, scalable program model in partnership with our educational system and our social infrastructures to transform one priority neighbourhood, Lawrence West. We are convinced that community partnerships with our social institutions is the path to build the models which will transform all of our underserved communities.
