Fun and Frolic

Finemaster Jeff M took the podium and proceeded to clean out our wallets of whatever might have been left after the Classic...

- In honor of International Women's Day, all women were fined \$3
- A mini bet on a Rotarian was held did George P know what SCUBA stands for. It wasn't a big money raiser because so many of us bet against George. In fact, it was Wes C who enlightened us that SCUBA = self-contained underwater breathing apparatus. Way to go Wes!

- The next Rotarian we got to bet on was Ernie T. Ernie did really well and those of us who bet against his answers were sorry. We learned that Schaumburg
 - Had 130 residents when it was incorporated on March 7, 1956
 - Currently has a population of 78,000
 - Is 19 ½ square miles in size (although there is nothing square about the boundary lines of Schaumburg today)
 - Was known as Sarah's Grove (because 3 of the farmers' wives were named Sarah) prior to being named Schaumburg in 1850 by Friedrich Heinrich Nerge.

<u>Our program</u>

Jim and Tina shared information about Dive Heart, an organization with a mission to build confidence, independence and self-esteem in the lives of children, adults and veterans with disabilities through scuba diving, scuba therapy and related activities. They shared two videos highlighting the success of their program.

We saw Tracy Carroll, a Navy veteran and experienced diver, who was diagnosed with ALS. She had always been a person who "lived life boldly" and felt as if the disease was robbing her of her identity as well as her mobility. She really wanted to dive again. She tried Googling "Scuba Diving with a Wheelchair" and found her way to Dive Heart. Through this program she is able to dive again. She feels empowered and in control of something, which feels very good. Along with the adaptive diving techniques she had to learn, she had to do some mental adaptation as well, including learning that it is okay to need help. The inclusivity of the Dive Heart program made that possible for her.

A second video told the story of a young woman Kristia, who has autism and has discovered a new world underwater. She described herself always being "that weird kid" before, but with Dive Heart she has finally found her place...with people she feels comfortable around...people who have a common interest...and a program that is inclusive of everyone. Her parents were also on the video and talked about the joy of seeing her grow and develop greater independence and sense of responsibility.

We also learned of the group's goal of creating a warm-water deep pool for training purposes. Most of their work is done in pools and they are always looking for new locations so they can expand their reach into more communities. They will be at two upcoming events to which we are all invited: a Rotary Means Business event in Naperville and a fund-raiser on March 27.
