# <u>Guest Speaker:</u> Katey Halliday—RYLA Oceania

- The inaugural RYLA Oceania program was launched in Sydney in January 2020. Here, the first ever RYLA Oceania cohort came together with a dedicated team of multi-talented program facilitators and highly motivated operations team members to kick off the journey
- The goal of RYLA Oceania is to develop a network of the brightest global citizens and leaders who are engaged, educated and pushed to achieve measurable results both individually and as a group within their communities.

- This program is targeted at RYLA Alumni who are seeking to continue their personal and professional development journey and have a genuine desire to make an impact on their local communities. Participants have opportunities to build on the skills and experience gained during District RYLA programs and further accelerate their personal and professional development
- The RYLA Oceania Program comprises of three main streams: a leadership curriculum, a mentoring program and a community project. The program runs over 12 months, commencing with a week-long leadership retreat that builds the foundation for the rest of the year
- Mentors are not assigned however each participant is taught the skills to find one
- Following the seven day retreat north of Sydney, leadership content is delivered via an online platform, promoting continued engagement and supporting the leaders' personal and professional development. The mentoring program is engineered to reinforce the personal development content and provide accountability for participants, whilst the community projects provide participants with the opportunity to develop their professional skills and make an actual impact on the community. At the end of the program, RYLArians can be assured they will walk away with the inspiration, motivation, knowledge and skills to solve the world's most pressing challenges
- There were 24 participants with an average age of 28
- Each participant has been assigned a 12 month community project—Katey's project is focused on diversity and inclusion in Rotary

#### <u>Chicken Outgrower Project:</u> Duncan Power

The Rotary sponsored farm of 'Mr and Mrs Sokum' now have their first baby chicks and the Trainers, whilst also practicing social distancing, are keeping in regular contact and making visits to ensure that the chickens remain healthy. Right now it is very hot in Siem Reap (days of 40 degree plus) and is the most challenging time in the year to raise chickens.

Using locally-sourced materials and local labour, construction of the shed began mid-March.

Despite uncertainties surrounding Covid-19, construction was completed on schedule at the end of March.







On 9May20, 500 5-day old chicks were placed in the outgrower sheds:





Phase 2 of training is now underway, guiding the outgrower farmers to take care of the chicks on their own property. Monitoring during this stage is crucial to ensure the farmers are putting what they learnt into best practice.
