typically requires repeated emergency and public safety services. Local data, collected by a UAS researcher, indicate such contacts have declined since the first 32 clients moved in in October, 2017.

The Assembly in September approved \$1.8 million (intended to attract a Alaska Housing Finance Corporation grant of \$2.8 million) toward a second phase. Glory Hall executive director, Mariya Lovishchuk is project coordinator. Adding 32

rooms will cost about \$6 million.

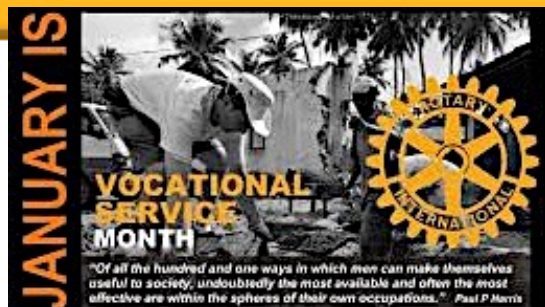
The local Housing First project provides a small apartment for each resident. Housing First is not a rehab program, but a medical office is on-site. The CBJ contributed a total of \$2.7 million to the initial effort. Juneau Rotarays coordinated a grant to provide bedding for each unit. Housing First expects to double in size

After just 15 months since it opened its doors, the Housing First facility in Lemon Creek is preparing to double its capacity. Housing First is a national movement that aims to provide permanent, safe housing for the most vulnerable chronically homeless individuals in a community. That population

The Object of Rotary is to “**encourage and foster the ideal of service as a basis of worthy enterprise** and, in particular, to encourage and foster:

FIRST – The development of acquaintance as an opportunity for service

SECOND – High ethical standards in business and professions; the recognition of worthiness of all useful occupations; and the dignifying of each Rotarian’s occupation as an opportunity to service society;

THIRD – The application of the ideal of service in each Rotarian’s personal, business, and community life;

FOURTH – The advancement of international understanding, goodwill, and peace through a world fellowship of business and professional persons united in the idea of service.

Exemplifying vocational service translates into mentoring, using your expertise to help your community, and behaving ethically to inspire others.
