JAMM (Juneau, Alaska Music Matters) is a tuition-free music program which helps youth develop focus, self-control, leadership, and teamwork through ensemble. Students experience success through community performance and daily practice, and understand that effort and persistence help them overcome life's challenges. Glacier Valley Elementary teacher (and recent recipient of an honorary doctorate) Lorrie Heagey founded the program eight years ago after spending a year immersed in El Sistema music education. That program, founded in Venezuela in 1975, promotes free music training to support healthy social development of impoverished children.

According to its website, JAMM provides 1.5 hours of weekly violin instruction to K-1 students. For youth in 2-5, after-school instruction in a selection of music is offered. Currently, 600 students participate in JAMM at three of six elementary schools and one of the two middle schools.

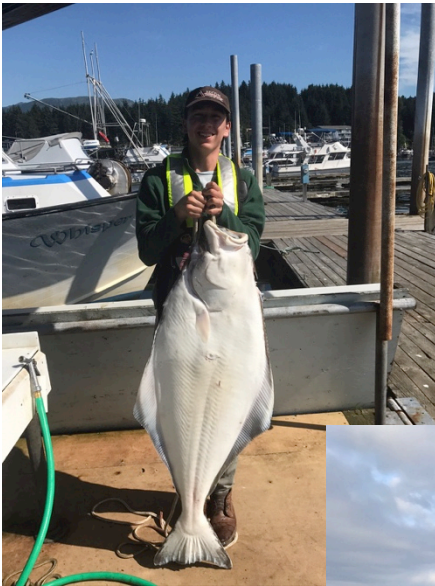

KIVA tops \$65,000

JGR made KIVA loans totaling \$1,265 to 16 small construction enterprises in ten countries Aug. 5. In nine years, the club has lent \$65,325 through 619 loans in 65 countries. The recent loans, mostly for \$100, went to Kenya, Armenia, Lebanon, the Democratic Republic of Congo, Bolivia, Vietnam, Cameroon, Rwanda and the Philippines. KIVA is a non-profit that facilitates micro-loans in 84 nations.
