


IMPACT OF YOUR PHILANTHROPY

A Word of Thanks...

During my Master of Arts in Global Governance at the Balsillie School of International Affairs (BSIA), I was able to use my Rotary Peace Scholarship to support a three-month volunteer internship with CIVICUS in Johannesburg, South Africa. CIVICUS is a global network of civil society organizations that works to facilitate citizen action by strengthening freedom of expression, association and assembly around the world. While Canada and its neighbours certainly face challenges of restricted public space, we come nowhere near the difficulties faced by so many countries. My experiences during this internship made me grateful, but also wary—to create positive, full-spectrum peace, civic space must be strengthened not chipped away.

Now, in my doctoral work, I study how diverse worldviews and belief systems interact with global governance processes and negotiations. Our ability to deal with the vast array of challenges and conflicts we face—from weapons proliferation to food insecurity and climate change—will depend on our understanding of how ideas and beliefs shape political action and decision-making. If we are to work for meaningful positive peace, we need to identify creative pathways for inclusion, compromise, and collective action. I thank the Rotary Club for supporting me and other students in our efforts to imagine and build a more peaceful world, and for your commitment to peace in our community and abroad.

A Word of Thanks...

I have long held a desire to dig deeper into issues related to peace and social justice. I've always wanted to understand the complexities behind these issues; why do they occur and what role can I play in mitigating them? Receiving the Rotary Peace Scholarship enabled me to dig deeper and ask harder questions. At the Balsillie School, I was surrounded by brilliant peers whose diversity of perspectives and experiences helped to shape my critical understandings. In focusing my research on orphan hood and child protection, I found a new passion for childhood studies and hope to pursue a PhD in this area.

The scholarship also supported my professional growth during my internship with Amnesty International's Southern Africa Regional Office in Johannesburg, South Africa. Here I was able to work on several research projects and expand my knowledge on human rights issues in Southern Africa. Most meaningful during my time in Johannesburg was developing a greater understanding of the multilayered and ongoing repercussions of colonialism and apartheid. There are many parallels between Canadian and South African colonial history and present, both in terms of systemic violence and acts of resistance, and I returned to Canada reinvigorated to challenge Canadian exceptionalism and engage in anti-racist and anti-colonial work.

I now work for Kennedy House Youth Services and Centennial College's Centre for Global Citizenship Education and Inclusion. In my position as Grant Writer at Kennedy House, I secure funds for our emergency youth shelter and after school program. Not only has this position deepened my understanding of economic inequality and its rippling impacts in Toronto, it has provided me with the opportunity to support young people as they transition from homelessness to improved wellbeing and stable, healthy futures. At Centennial College, I engage in a variety of research projects on global citizenship, equity and inclusion and work with my colleagues to embed social justice principles across the College. I also engage in anti-racist community organizing with Showing Up For Racial Justice Toronto, specifically helping to lead a Childminding Collective which makes activism more accessible for parents and caregivers.

Thanks to the Rotary Peace Scholarship, I have been able to complete my studies with the Balsillie School of International Affairs without financial worry and focus my time into furthering my knowledge of Iraqi politics and Middle East Affairs. As such, I am now working with the Institute on Governance on their Iraq Team where I travel to Iraq regularly to work as a Senior Researcher on the Fiscal Federalism and Decentralization project, funded by Global Affairs Canada. This work assists in the broader objectives of peace by helping to build the capacity of the federal and provincial governments to better deliver citizen services, an essential objective in establishing trust and legitimacy of government with the citizens of Iraq.

A common refrain heard by those who study conflict and peace is that good governance is essential for peace to endure in post-conflict states; our work hopes to actualize that objective. As I write this, I am also preparing to go to Rome to present for the second time at the Academic Council of the United Nations Annual Meeting on my team's work in Iraq, and then head to Baghdad for interviews to begin a needs assessment and gaps analysis at the provincial level in Diwaniyah and Missan.

Thank you for supplying me with the ability to better focus on my studies which has thus allowed me to better do my job!

Shinjita Alam was born and raised in a fundamentalist Muslim family in Bangladesh, and denied an arranged marriage at the age of sixteen in order to pursue her education past high school. In 1992, she graduated from the University of Dhaka with a Masters degree in Social Welfare, in a class of few female students. Her own childhood experiences with gender-based discrimination led her to work with Families for Children, a non-profit, non-sectarian agency helping women and children in India and Bangladesh.

In July 1993, Shinjita met members of Mennonite Central Committee (MCC) and began working with their programs in women's income generation. She noticed immediately that community relationships were often strained because of constant quarrelling between individuals: mothers and their children, husbands and wives, and women among each other. To increase the women's income but to do so without peace was not helpful, she observed.

Chinenye Chukwuma-Nwuba completed her undergraduate degree in politics and international relations in Nigeria and is one of several international students currently enrolled in the Masters of Peace and Conflict Studies (MPACS) program at Conrad Grebel University College at the University of Waterloo.

Growing up in Nigeria during times of relative peace and then violence, Chinenye brings her own perspective and experience to the program to gain a deeper understanding of what conflict is and how it develops. "For a while everything was okay, and then sometime in 2000 our lives turned upside down and there were religious riots. We lost a couple of friends, relatives and lost some of our belongings. When you witness this sort of thing, it stays with you... I think that's what pushed me to want to understand people more and want to understand the dynamics of conflict: how people change, why people change."

Issa Ebombolo joined the MPACS program in 2014 and has been a remarkable addition to the program. Congolese by nationality, Issa has lived in Zambia for a period of 19 years. While in Zambia, Issa founded the Mennonite Central Committee's organization Peace Clubs in Zambia in 2006. The knowledge and skills he was able to gather through his experiences growing up in the Congo and working in Zambia allowed him to make important contributions to his classes. Classmates quickly recognized Issa through this charismatic nature and valuable contributions to class discussions.

Grateful for his time in the MPACS program, Issa credits his success to many aspects of the MPACS program. He mentions four courses specifically: Conflict Analysis, The Practice of Peace, Conflict Transformation, and Building Civil Society. Together, he says these courses taught him how to analyze a conflict before taking action, how to reflect and learn how to create a plan in coordination with the analysis, and exactly what is needed in order bring peace. Finally, the course on building civil society taught him how to work with civil society organizations and how to build a working relationship with the NGOs causing the conflict within MCC.

After graduation, Issa will join MCC as the National Peace Coordinator in Zambia, Peace Resource Person in Southern Africa, and Chair of Africa Mennonite Peace Network. Among many of the projects these roles entail, creating a program and team of people to help deal with the conflicts between MCC-funded NGOs in Southern Africa. Since there is a high demand for MCC's funding, limited resources, and corruption within the funding, Issa will be responsible for facilitating a network between the peace officers in every MCC office in Africa and mediating conflicts between host families and foreign workers.
