RI Presidential Message - October

In October 1914, Jonas Salk was born – a man who would change world history by inventing the first effective vaccine against polio. When the vaccine was introduced in the United States in the 1950s, polls indicated that polio was one of the nation's two greatest fears, second only to the fear of atomic war. And with good reason: In the 1952 U.S. polio epidemic, 58,000 cases were reported, with 3,145 deaths and

21,269 instances of permanent, disabling paralysis. Globally, polio paralyzed or killed up to half a million people every year.

Soon after the Salk vaccine was

created, Albert Sabin developed an oral version, allowing tremendous numbers of children to be immunized quickly, safely, and inexpensively. In 1985, Rotary's PolioPlus program was born, with a simple goal: to immunize every child under age five against this crippling disease. Thanks in large part to the initial success of PolioPlus, in 1988 the 166 member states of the World Health Assembly unanimously set the goal of global polio eradication.

At the time, the idea was breathtakingly ambitious, and many called it impossible. Today, we are closer to this goal than ever before, with only a few hundred cases of polio reported per year, and just three remaining We are on track to achieve full eradication by 2018 – if we can keep up the momentum that has brought us this far.

And this month, we will mark World Polio Day on 24 October, and celebrate the 100th anniversary of Dr. Salk's birth.

I ask you all to Light Up Rotary this month by doing whatever you can to shine a spotlight on our efforts to eradicate polio. Call your government offi-

cials and let them know that polio eradication matters to you. Go to endpolionow.org for inspiring stories about Rotary's work, and share them on social media. And make the best investment you'll ever make, by donating to polio eradication right on the endpolionow.org

website and earning a two-to-one match on your contribution from the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation.

When we eradicate polio – and we will – we'll have brought the world into a better future, and Rotary into a better future as well. We will have proved ourselves, as an organization, capable of great things. And we will have given our children and grandchildren a gift that will endure forever: a polio-free world.

OCTOBER - VOCATIONAL MONTH

What is vocational service? If you are an active, engaged Rotarian, you probably view vocational service as a way of life, even if you find it diffi-

cult to articulate a clear definition. We can help you gain a better understanding of vocational service and equip you with ideas to help you practice it through your club activities and in your career.

The concept of vocational service

The Object of Rotary is a philosophical statement of Rotary's purpose and the responsibilities of Rotarians. The concept of vocational service is rooted in the Second Object, which calls on Rotarians to "encourage and foster":

- * High ethical standards in business and professions;
- * The recognition of the worthiness of all useful occupations;
- * The dignifying of each Rotarian's occupation as an opportunity to serve society.



As a Rotarian, how can you put these ideals into action?

Consider these suggestions:

- * Talk about your vocation in your club, and take time to learn about fellow members 'vocations.
- * Use your professional skills to serve a community.
- * Practice your profession with integrity, and inspire others to behave ethically through your own words and actions.
- * Help a young person achieve his or her career aspirations.
- * Guide and encourage others in their professional development.

If you do any of these things, you are performing vocational service. And if vocational service motivates and energizes you, then you're in the right place, because vocational service is the very essence of Rotary. It is what sets Rotary apart from other service organizations.

GOVERNOR NOMINATION FORM

By Now every Club have received the Governor Nomination form for 2017-2018. Don't forget to send your nomination by or before January 5, 2015.

Please keep in mind when nominating a candidate to comply with the RI rules.

For example:

"A fundamental principle of Rotary is that the best qualified candidate should be selected for service in elective offices.



The RI Bylaws prohibit any effort by a candidate, a candidate's supporter, or any Rotarian to influence the selection process in a positive or negative manner, including but not limited to, campaigning or canvassing. The RI Board developed these guidelines to assist Rotarians in better understanding election procedures:

For All Rotarians

Review and comply with RI's election guidelines as explained in the following documents:

- * RI Bylaws: Articles 10, 12 and 13
- * Rotary Code of Policies: Sections 17.040, 19.030, and 26.100


Avoid any actions designed to gain visibility, publicize candidate names and achievements, or give anyone an unfair advantage over someone else.

For Candidates

Immediately express disapproval in writing of any campaigning activities undertaken on your behalf and ask for the actions to cease.

Do not respond in a similar manner to another candidate's improper activities.

Do not communicate with or visit clubs involved in the election, except to fulfill necessary functions. If there are any concerns that a current assignment or a new assignment may give an appearance of campaigning, consult with the district governor. Routine performance of assigned activities is not a violation of Rotary's election policies.







Four months into this year of working to Light Up Rotary, I am more excited about Rotary than ever before. I've been to 22 countries, visited dozens of cities, and met thousands of Rotarians. I've seen amazing projects and been inspired over and over again by the terrific work Rotarians do all over the world. And I've been privileged to be part of all kinds of Rotary events, from club meetings to Rotary institutes, from Rotary Days to Foundation dinners.

We look forward to Rotary meetings. Even when our lives are busy, we make Rotary a priority – because we want to see our friends, and we want to serve.

That is why Rotary is still here, after more than 109 years. In Chinese, we say:

History of the Rotary Foundation


At the 1917 convention, outgoing RI President Arch C. Klumph proposed to set up an endowment "for the purpose of doing good in the world." In 1928, it was renamed The Rotary Foundation, and it became a distinct entity within Rotary International.


Growth of the Foundation

In 1929, the Foundation made its first gift of \$500 to the International Society for Crippled Children. The organization, created by Rotarian Edgar F. "Daddy" Allen, later grew into Easter Seals.

When Rotary founder Paul Harris died in 1947, contributions began pouring in to Rotary International, and the Paul Harris Memorial Fund was created to build the Foundation.

Rotary and the United Nations

In 1945, representatives of 50 countries met in San Francisco at the United Nations Conference on International Organization to draw up the United Nations Charter. Those delegates deliberated on the basis of proposals worked out by the representatives of China, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom and the United States at Dumbarton Oaks, United States in August-October 1944. The Charter was signed on 26 June 1945 by the representatives of the 50 countries. Poland, which was not represented at the Conference, signed it later and became one of the original 51 Member States. The United Nations officially came into existence on 24 October 1945, when the Charter had been ratified by China, France, the Soviet Union, the United Kingdom, the United States and by a majority of other signatories.

United Nations Day is celebrated on 24 October each year.

'The first meeting of the UN took place in London on the 16th January 1946, hosted by District 13 at the Caxton Hall, presided over by RI President Tom Warren, who declared it to be the 'touchstone for a gesture of international goodwill unique in the history of Rotary'. President of RIBI, Tom Benson said 'UN is a new beginning in international co-operation to make peace; Rotary, wherever established, is pledged to the ideal of service to mankind in international affairs'





Invitation to the model United Nations

Young people between the ages of 15 and 24 represent approximately 18% of today's global population, and they are increasingly mobilising and impacting social dialogue at both the community and global levels. The capacity of each society to progress is based largely on its capacity to incorporate the contribution and responsibility of youth in building and designing its future. In addition to their imagination, energy, intellectual contributions and ability to mobilise support, young people bring unique perspectives that must be taken into account.



The Rotary Club of Central Port of Spain lives this belief through our annual signature youth event – Model United Nations (MUN) – which will be held in Trinidad from 20-22 March 2015. This innovative youth assembly brings Caribbean secondary school students together to discuss issues that impact our world, as they play the part of UN member states.

Participation in MUN teaches our young people Research and presentation skills and an awareness of global issues. Exposure to UN protocols and global perspectives ensures that our young people see the world differently. They appreciate different cultures, build tolerance of differences, and as a result, create a more open and caring society. This creates a dialogue of peace and reconciliation, reducing crime and violence, supporting both the rule of law and Rotary ideals of a peaceful world.


