# **SPEAKER REVIEW by Patty Roos**

Jake Michael, AICP, a Senior Demographer with Chester County Planning Commission spoke today about Millennials. There are no precise dates for when this cohort starts or ends; demographers and researchers typically use the early 1980s as starting birth years and the mid-1990s to early 2000s as ending birth years which would put them between the ages of 15-34 years of age. They are a quarter of the population and make up about 24.3% of Chester County. Millennials (also known as Generation Y) are overall happy with their quality of life and find walkability, bike lanes and public transportation important. They highly value different customs and backgrounds and a large amount have low income status due to educational debt.

The idea that Millennials prefer to live in the city is not true and they can be found almost equally between city and suburbs. The reason a lot of Millennials have stayed in cities is because the rent was cheaper, but that is now changing. The average amount Millennials want to pay for rent is \$925, but the average rent in the suburbs is \$ 1192 and does not necessarily offer the walkability or public transportation that is important to them. Whereas Generation X had expectations of owning a single family home, Millennials are fine renting. The challenge for planning commissions is how to provide affordable homes out in the suburbs. Median home prices in Chester County are around \$ 300,000.

There is an increase in Hispanic and Asian Millennials in Chester County but 45% people of color might be either sending money back to their families in another country or supporting parents here.

Options for long term solutions that involve public transportation in Chester County are: The Exton Train Station Improvement Project, Kennett Square Mixed Use Development, Phoenixville Trails and Streetscapes and Downingtown Station Bike Racks.

Since the Millennial age ranges from 15 to 34 years, one should not try and stereotype because the age range includes teenagers to adults in their 30's.
