SPEAKERS REVIEW by Chris Feryo

Our Speaker on Rotoplast, Paul Quintavalla, was introduced by **Christina Combee**

The mission of Rotoplast is to provide corrective plastic surgery to children with cleft lip and cleft palate in areas of the world where the surgery might not otherwise be available.

Cleft lip and palate usually occurs in the 1st trimester of pregnancy and is caused often by lack of folic acid due to diet or because of a hereditary defect. It affects 1 in 650 births and can happen to anyone.

Cleft lip surgery usually takes about ½ hour while the cleft palate surgery is much more complicated and can even take multiple surgeries to correct.

Paul recently completed a mission to the capital city of Myanmar, Naypyidaw. There were 22 other Rotarians on the mission with him. The Rotarians brought much of their own equipment for the 3 surgeons completing the operations. Burn victims were also treated as part of the mission. Many of the 100 children treated came with their whole families including fathers and siblings. They often travelled a great distance to see the doctors. While the cost per child varies greatly based on numbers, on average each surgery costs \$1000.

Paul informed us that volunteers are always welcome. The requirements are that the Rotarian participates in a mission and is willing to go out and spread the word about Rotoplast through speaking engagements.

To end the program, **President Mickey** presented Paul with a \$1000 check on behalf of the club.

FROM ROTARY INTERNATIONAL

Beneath the emotional scars of living in a Ukrainian war zone, Mykyta Berlet flashes the same mischievousness of any other 12-year-old boy headed to camp.

He wants to laugh, play pranks and on the last night of camp "we will cover everyone with toothpaste," he says excitedly.

Mykyta and 25 other Ukrainian youths headed to the resort town of Zakopane in the foothills of southern Poland are naturally focused on fun. But their two-week respite organized by Rotary members has a higher purpose: To help the children heal and cope with the trauma they may encounter when they go home.

Each camper has a parent or sibling killed or injured in the fighting in Ukraine. Psychologists at camp will guide them along the way during an itinerary that mixes escape and therapy.

Olga Zmiyivska, a member of the Rotary Club of Kharkiv Multinational in Ukraine, has brought children to the camp for two years and has witnessed its impact.

"After the trip, they are more willing to make contact and open their hearts," she said.
