Then he got down to more serious business as we welcomed visiting Rotarians John Saling and Charles Streitwieser. Guests included Gabriel Bay, our exchange student, and his host parents, Ellen and Mark, introduced by Carol Hanson. Laura Aloisio introduced her dad, Dave, and Steve Miersch introduced his guest Mark, who came last week but didn't get introduced due to the visit from our District Governor.

Conducting the meeting in her own style, **Past President Katie** showed a Throwback Thursday photo from **President Bob Rogers's** installation. She also asked members to send her funny photos of members for use at the Ex-Sergeant of Arms event coming up.

Paula Ott was happy to announce that her longtime friend, Michelle Venema is the new CEO of Home of the Sparrow, an area non-profit. Charles Streitwieser was happy to announce he has put in his application to return his membership to our club. Past President Katie reported happy news from Tamara Minnick (in Tamara's absence) that the company Tamara was working for has renewed her job, and that her health is improving.

**Mac Neilon** wished birthday greetings to **Dan Cosgrove**, commenting that you learn a lot about a person when you run together. **Bob Frame**, wishing greetings to **Kevin Quinn**, reported you also learn a lot about a person when you play golf together.

**Linda Hicks** kicked off announcements by reporting that 230 stockings were delivered on behalf of our club to the yearly Stockings for Soldiers project. Now, we need to bring in small items of food, paperback books, snacks, etc.to put in the stockings by Nov. 17<sup>th.</sup> If folks don't want to donate items, they can donate \$2 or more, because the Stockings project must pay to have the stockings shipped.

## **SPEAKER'S REVIEW By Cathy Palmquist**

Shauna Yeldell, chair of the Community Philanthropic Committee announced that \$33,400 is being awarded to 15 area nonprofit organizations, out of 31 organizations who applied for grants. She explained that the funds are generated by the annual Chili Cook-off. Shauna, and her co-chair, Matt Holliday, acknowledged the CPC, tasked with reading the numerous grant applications and accompanying materials.

Hallie Romanowski, executive director of Act in Faith said the funds would be used in the Housing Stabilization Program, which assisted in keeping 300 families from eviction last year. ARC of Chester County's executive director, Jeanne Meikrantz, introduced Michael Donovan, who explained the funds will help clients with needs such as transportation and socialization activities. Kenneth Klein, board member of Chester County Children, Inc., said their funds will help keep at-risk children out of trouble in the summer by providing them a camp experience. Their organization is made up of volunteers who work with the children through the Chester Co. Dept. of Children, Youth and Families.

Chester County Family Academy executive director, Sue Flynn, said funds will support the music and literacy programs for children, all of whom come from low-income families. Community Volunteers in Medicine representative, Catherine Binz, said the funds will help provide comprehensive health and dental support to some of the 3,000 working adults in Chester County who live at 300% below the poverty line. Dolly Wideman-Scott, executive director of the Domestic Violence Center, said the funds will be used for group and individual counseling of survivors of domestic violence, and for creating social change. Lorri Sarosv. development director of Friends Association of Chester County, said the funds will be used at the homeless shelter, for rental assistance, and in their new program, Outreach to Homeless Families. Interfaith Housing Assistance Corp. executive director, Joyce Lacy, and Deb McGinty, said their funds will go to help kids of single, working parents. Rotary funds help provide opportunities for music lessons or to go to camp.

Read2Dream was represented by Carol Baker, who said the funds will provide new reading material to families with children and for parents who read at various reading levels, themselves. Jeanne Corman, executive director of Safe Harbor, said their funds will help provide safe, clean, temporary housing for homeless women and men, enabling staff to connect them with resources to help them transition back into the community. Funds will also help purchase food. Over 1,100 meals were served to the homeless last vear. Terri Potrako, executive director of The Volunteer English Program, said that VEP helps adult immigrants learn English to enhance the economic and social quality of their lives. Over 30 volunteers. annually, help immigrants who speak over 30 different languages. Rotary funds will help with the purchase of workbooks for immigrants.

Kathy Sullivan, director of the West Chester Area Senior Center, said the funds will help double the dollars for the grandparents program they share with the Chester County Family Academy. Funds will

also help provide food boxes for seniors in the winter, and nutritional information to seniors and children alike. The West Chester Public Library's Teens and Tweens program will benefit from Rotary funds, said Victoria Dow, executive director. Funds will provide access to additional STEM and Robotics materials. Rick Roberts, executive director of Young Men and Women in Charge Foundation, and site coordinator Tanya Baxter, said the funds will target youth, 5<sup>th</sup> 12<sup>th</sup> who are economically through grades, disadvantaged and historically underrepresented in STEM, to excel and become leaders in STEM, through math and science programs after school and in the summer. Funds will help purchase Robotics materials. Home of the Sparrow is an organization that works with women facing homelessness, helping over 400 women a year secure housing and working to achieve long-term stability.
