It requires time commitment and a level of technical skill. > Rob Gia this will be the last time for the raffles—it's been fantastic. Thanks to all, he needs the books back by next week.







Ian Cameron

- \Rightarrow A team was formed to look at the practicalities and pitfalls of setting up a Rotaract Club.
- \Rightarrow They have had a chequered history and the Crosslands Club did not last long.
- ⇒ One of the difficulties facing many is that at that of the age of young people who are transient with uni and travels and it is difficult to keep the membership intact.
- \Rightarrow What is it?
 - There are a lot of ideals for vocational and community spirit in Rotary
 - 18.30 exchange ideas
 - Develop leadership and professional skills through service
 - Meet regularly in a hotel, etc. in a less formal setting than we have here
 - There are a lot of activities that can be done with other RCs and activities too

- There are clubs in 184 countries
- There are 10,904 clubs—Australia has 70 and our District 4 with 3 under formation
- There are 50.792 Rotaractors

lan Cameron Rotaractors decide how they will run after their sponsor RCs help to form them. In North Sydney there are 8 RCs that are planning to jointly start a Rotaract Club.

Amanda Firkins on developing the Rotaract Club in District 9685. Thank you she has met couple of times with Ian and found them a jovial bunch.

She has been n Rotaract for 8 yrs and in the Crosslands Club that her parents introduced her to. They had met at a Rotary event. Her mother came from Brisbane and her father from Melbourne. At 18 they urged her to join.

She had done Girl Guides and at school volunteered for the Salvos. She'd meet people at projects or events, but was not able to maintain the relationships. With Rotaract it tied it all together—her mum found the club and she has not looked back ever since.

Eight years ago she was not able to talk to such a room full of people, but through Rotaract and RYLA she overcame her nervousness. They get doers and people look for new members through their network of friends. There is career development after the day to day.

The Rotary sponsors advise the Rotaract President on why they started and encourage other RC member to attend as well.

Rotaract has young people from 18-30yrs and focuses on leadership and personal development skills with more networking for club events and socials. We are fortunate that Rotaract Australia has its own club and Board. For the last eight years she has gone to Adelaide for the conferences and games with very inspiring speakers.

You can see tyour full potential and lead on to Rotary through this networking. She has been inspired by attending the District Conference with so many great things.

Thank you for all you do & for forming this club and she is happy to help in any way she can. *Ian Cameron* Amanda has already been a great support along with her colleague, Andrew Long from D 9675.

Barry Rassin set the challenge to develop Rotaract Clubs.

The small committee met in October and includes Janelle Speight, Lucy Dahill, Stuart Armstrong, Rob Gia and Ian Cameron. They will work as the steering committee for the formation of the club and the appointment of the Chair.

The other clubs involved in the Ku-ring-gai area are Turramurra and St Ives. The Committee will take over once the club is formed.

Lucy Dahill was Involved with Rotaract in the UK and collaboration with experienced Rotaractors helped with how to address issues. It's been positive with 2-3 meetings so far and another one today.

Ian Cameron—key partnerships

- The San—and Brett Goods, with Melva Lee in HR. They have potential members in the age group and a database to help with promotions. Brett does a fortnightly video conference and can include this as part of his communications.
- PCYC, located in Waitara, have large numbers of young people attending there and will
 open a database and they have wonderful coffee and cake.
- Ku-ring-gai Youth Forum—Lucy is interested here and knows Cherise who is their activities organiser.
- Plus we have the Rylarian Alumni we can canvas, who would make ideal Rotaractors.
- The district may sponsor some clubs and wants to measure interest.
- Sue Owen has a list from RYPEN Alumni from 2016. They are of the age and show great interest.

The core team will meet in January including some Rylarians who are more experienced and they will form the steering group, that goes on to become the organisational committee, that goes on to charter the new club.

The proposed name of the club is The Hornsby Ku-ring-gai Rotaract—HKR Club.

When the cluster Presidents meet in the near future, we will share our plans with them, and hope that they will support the start-up of the new Rotaract Club. You are all encouraged to be involved by helping to find potential Rotaractors. Please tell family and colleagues. There is a timeline for this club's creation.

President Stuart At the RI Convention Barry Rassin made it clear he is very, very keen to start more Rotaract clubs—he'd like to double the numbers as Rotaractors feed into RCs. Amanda is now a two week old Rotarian, but in the past there was not a very good grab from Rotaractor to Rotarian.

In East Timor the District was involved with a few kids going to District RYLA and from this they were very enthusiastic to set up RYLA and in time to have Rotaract and then a RC—so the formation of two RCs came from the young people who were inspired by the RI convention. It is your duty to encourage others to join RCs.

Bob Howe raised the issue of the age cutting out at 30 and that this is often too early to consider joining a RC. In Apex they go to 40 and farewell them then, not 30 and even if Rotartact went to 35 there could be more likelihood of them going on to join a RC.

President Stuart suggested if this was a local motion it could be put to the D 9685 and this could go forward to Evanston.

It is very important that we get more Rotaract Clubs and that RXCs sponsor them and maintain a close relationship with them and communication.

He himself had a debate about which club to join and this shouldn't be a problem as all are in the Rotary family.

In England the Rotaract clubs are linked to RCs and you can go to them both. If they don't want you, then this is rather sad and shows you are not doing your job properly..

They generally meet 2 weekly, so it is not onerous. Keeping the link develops leadership skills.

He joined Rotary at 32 and had the meetings in his diary, so you don't drop out and carry on You get good care in vocational education and training and it gives young people an anchor point to learn leadership skills that we can conduct sessions for them.

RYLA is a starting point and within our capabilities and skills—like leadership skills 18.30. Look to learn aspects we can introduce in training and education for young folks to encourage them and give them a social circle.

Peter Smith this is a hopeful start. With 184 Rotaract Clubs in the world there is great spread when you consider the total number of countries is 195.

Sending this message to the District to send on to Evanston would be good.

Amanda Firkins Rotartact has no governing body, even though they come under the RI banner. The closest it comes to this is for 2.5 days before the RI Convention when matters on a great scale internationally are discussed and shared. She has attended it for five years and each country has an MDIO—Multi-Disciplinary Information Organisation.

All chairs meet to discuss the District and zone and what they will do at the Rotaract Club level. Big W has a Rotaract Club in the US.

Rotaract Clubs are thinly spread in Australia—in one UK District there were almost 60 Rotaract clubs for a population of 900,000 people; in Australia there are 30 clubs across the whole country. We help each other and the more you get the more help you get. It is our duty to encourage more people to join Rotaract and then Rotary.

President Stuart thanked all guests and Amanda who is happy to give help. Next week we have a mystery 5 Star Fellowship and Joan and Jan will update up on the Mongolia project.


