# PRESS RELEASE Rotary Club of Whistler August 29, 2016

Through a generous grant from the Community Foundation, The Rotary Club of Whistler is continuing their work in support of the Don MacLaurin Forest Sign Project. The project has focused its current efforts on the Whistler Interpretive Forest area - located just off of Cheakamus Lake Road. This Interpretive Forest was created and developed over the past thirty year period by fellow Rotarian Don MacLaurin whose work and legacy has been honoured with a memorial sign just up the road next to the suspension bridge.

The Rotary Club of Whistler Clean-Up Crew sprung into action on Saturday, August 27th at the Whistler Interpretive Forest. Following a photo opportunity at Don's memorial sign, the group got to work cleaning the signs along Craterview Loop. Craterview loop is 1km loop through the forest. It has several signs that point out the forest management work that has been completed in the area. Recently, the road has been cleared making it more accessible for outdoor enthusiasts. It's great for a slow drive and even better for mountain bikes.

The funding received from the Community Foundation of Whistler will support ongoing public education signage, culvert and clean up work in the Whistler Interpretive Forest.
