Washington State Apple Blossom Festival



Wenatchee, May 3-5

The festival hosting season kicks off with the Washington State Apple Blossom Festival in Wenatchee. With the theme "The Party Never Ends," the Apple Blossom Festival is celebrating its centennial anniversary this year. Sir Knight Morris Westlund, who claims to have been there for the first festival, is the chair for the Royal Rosarian visit and reports there has been an "unbelievable turn-out" of Rosarians and spouses to join him and Prime Minister Don to help Wenatchee celebrate the 100 year anniversary. This once in a lifetime historical event will be a blast and not to be missed.

The Washington State Apple Blossom Festival, originally called "Blossom Days", was founded as a one-day festival in 1919 to celebrate the importance of the apple industry to the region. Following World War II, the festival was renamed the Washington State Apple Blossom Festival to more accurately reflect the importance of the apple industry in North Central Washington. Held during the last days of April and early May, the festival has grown to eleven days.

The Wenatchee Applarians is the hosting and goodwill organization for the community and host for the hospitality weekend, May 3-5. The hospitality packet is \$300 for a couple and \$175 for a single. The packet covers access to the hospitality suite, the Queen's Ball on Friday, breakfast on Saturday, seating for the parade if not marching and the "100th Jubilee Derby" Saturday night. There will be a rose planting by the Royal Rosarians on Saturday morning.

Spokane Lilac Festival

Spokane, May 17-19

Spokane and the Lilac Festival is the destination for the second out-of-town trek. The Lilac Festival's mission statement is "Honoring Our Military, Empowering Our Youth, and Showcasing Our Region." Started in 1938 by the Associated Garden Clubs and Spokane Floral Society to showcase the area's beautiful spring flowers and the area's youth, the festival is now a week of festivities in May combining the city's famous lilacs with events that culminate in the nation's largest Armed Forces Torchlight Parade.



Hosting weekend is May 17-19. The hosting group is a committee of the festival's managing organization. Planned is the Queen's Luncheon and Lilac Festival Gala on Friday. Saturday has the Rosarian Rose Planting Ceremony and the Armed Forces Torchlight Parade that evening. There is a farewell breakfast on Sunday. The hospitality room will be open on Friday and Saturday. The guest package is \$280 for a couple and \$140 for singles. The host hotel is the Davenport Hotel with a rate of \$165 for Lilac Festival guests.

New Westminster Hyack Festival



New Westminster, B.C., May 24-26

The last weekend in May brings the New Westminster Hyack Festival, our first international hosting event for the 2019 festival season. New Westminster was selected as the first capital of the new colony of British Columbia and officially named by Queen Victoria after her favorite part of London. The official naming by the Queen gave New Westminster its nickname "The Royal City" and recognition for being the first city in Western Canada.

The word Hyack is from the Chinook Indian dialect and means "quick" or "fast". New Westminster's volunteer firemen were a lively lot back in the 1860's, so they called themselves the Hyack Fire Company.

Activities for the hosting weekend include a reception and formal banquet on Friday, International Parade, luncheon, Rose Planting Ceremony, artillery firing and Heritage Masquerade Ball/Dinner on Saturday and a Farewell Breakfast on Sunday. The Hospitality Suite

will be available throughout the weekend.

The package is \$390 (CDN) for couples and \$195 (CDN) for singles. Registration can be done online by clicking the link below. The host hotel is the Inn at the Quayside. Ask for the "2019 Hyack Festival Block" when making a reservation. Room rates start at \$144 (CDN).

Rose Garden Contest

Recognizing Portland's Best Rose Gardens

The Royal Rosarian Foundation announced the 81st Annual Rose Garden Contest. The Rose Festival approved event celebrates the best of rose growing in the Portland area with competition in several divisions for rose plantings and rose displays.

This is a free event to enter and attend. The contest is open to all rose growers within 20 miles of the Pioneer Courthouse Square, Portland, Oregon, as verified by electronic mapping system. No garden club membership is required to enter the contest. Applications must be postmarked no later than May 24 and the on-site judging takes place on June 2.



One division is for Royal Rosarians only. If you have roses in your garden now is the time to start primping them. If you need some advice there are a couple of experts in the ranks. Check with Royal Gardener Harry Landers or Lord High Chancellor Kimberly Bown.

The participating rose gardens will be celebrated at the Rose Garden Contest Awards Ceremony honoring the

winners on Tuesday, June 18 at 6:30 pm in the Royal Rosarian Garden in the Washington Park International Rose Test Garden.

The Rose Garden Contest is supported by donations from rose-loving Portlanders. Donations can be made to the Royal Rosarian Foundation to benefit the contest. This will enable the Royal Rosarians to treat the contest winners and guests to the special event in Portland's own Rose Garden. Queens' Garden Party

A Rosarian History

The Queens' Garden Party is an event to honor past Rose Festival Queens and an opportunity for the Princesses to get together with their courts. Let's look back through the years to see how the Queens' Garden Party has evolved to what it is today.

Worth Caldwell organized a Queen's Reception in 1983 at the Japanese Garden Pavilion at the Japanese Garden, a place of much beauty affording a lovely panorama of the Rose Gardens, the city and Mt. Hood as a background. The distinguished men and women who received honorary



knighthood that year, the Queen and her court, and the Rosarian Council enjoyed a Japanese High Tea sponsored by Mr. Marv Tonkin. The event was chaired by Sir Knights Tony Pasion and Larry Cervarich. The next year the event continued with the same format under Prime Minister Ralph Shepherd.

Under Prime Minister Gary Ferlisi, the Queen's Reception was again held in the Japanese Garden Pavilion with a luncheon for the honorary knightees, the Queen and her court and the Rosarian Council.

Under Prime Minister Thomas Drake, the honorary knightees, the Queen and her court, and the Council enjoyed the Queen's Reception at the Red Lion in 1986, sponsored by Paulson Investment Company.

In 1987, the Queen's Reception was held at the Pittock Mansion, a larger venue with a beautiful view. Cebert Bryan was the Prime Minister.

In 1989, under Prime Minister Jeff Metzker, the first three women, Dee Denton, Rosalie Pauly and Patty Hufford, were knighted as members of the Royal Rosarians. Honorary knightees that year included Gov. Betty Roberts and Portland Mayor Vera Katz, who were among those hosted at the Queen's Reception.

The Queen's Reception was held at the Montgomery Park Atrium in 1990 under Prime Minister Tony Pasion. Queen Erin and her court dined with the dignitaries and at the end, as was tradition, received their princess rings in the design of a rosebud with a diamond in the center.

Following the 1994 Rose Festival theme of "From the Window," Prime Minister Ed Honeycutt and the Council hosted the Queen and her court and the honorary knightees at Atwater Restaurant atop the US Bank Tower. It continued being held there for several years.

Under Prime Minister Tedd Chilless the Queens' Garden Party was opened to include 200 guests in 2001. Council person Fran Scearce and Duke of the Realm Ed Honeycutt chaired a successful event.

A new tradition was started under Prime Minister Bob Woody with an invitation to all the past Queens of Rosaria to attend as our guests. Twelve past queens, including Queen Frances Hulse from 1938, attended the Queens' Garden Party in 2003.

In 2007, the year the Rose Festival Foundation celebrated its Centennial, 26 former Queens of Rosaria shared stories and reveled in past glories at the Queens' Garden Party with an audience that exceeded 400. Bob Strader was Prime Minister.

At the Queens' Garden Party in 2008, 350 attendees enjoyed remarks from former astronaut Brig. General Susan Helms, Will Vinton and two members of the Kingsmen ("Louie, Louie"), who had just received honorary knighthood. Prime Minister Peter Glazer, lawyer and Portland's greatest 60's music fan had as guests at the luncheon five judges, three district attorneys, Johnny Limbo, and pianist Michael Allen Harrison (a classmate of Brig. Gen. Susan Helms). The ballroom at the DoubleTree Lloyd Center was filled.

Under Prime Minister Marilyn Schultz, the past queens at the 2015 Queens' Garden Party were delighted to find themselves being honored as Honorary Rosarians. In years since, past Queens who haven't attended a Queens' Garden Party since 2016 and the past year's Queen are honored as Honorary Rosarians with a certificate and a medallion.

More recently the Queens' Garden Party has been reaching out to the courts, inviting the princesses to attend. Further, the Rose Festival Foundation has reached out to the 50-year courts, encouraging them to be a part of the Rose Festival. They are also invited to attend the Queens' Garden Party and have been included on Royal Rosarian floats in the Grand Floral parade a few times.

The Queens' Garden Party continues to be an event that is enjoyed by all the Royal Rosarians and is a treasured time for the past courts to enjoy each other's company again. Be sure to attend this year!

Rose Buds



Empress Josephine Roses

In the early 19th century, the Empress Josephine, wife of Napoleon Bonaparte, became one of the biggest collectors of old roses. Her ambition was to create the greatest collection of roses in her garden at Malmaison in France. She started developing the rose garden in 1798, and at the moment of her death in 1814 she had collected as many as 250 different types of roses. She also created a few new species. Her garden is still one of the best sources for ancient roses.

Gardeners are trying to bring back the forgotten glory of old roses. During the last 200 years, many hybrids have been created. One of the first of them was made by famous Moravian scientist Gregor

Mendel. Unfortunately, there is a problem - many of the newer species usually don't smell as wonderful as the old ones did. During the process of breeding, many of them have lost their unique scent. It is believed that currently there are around 30,000 varieties of roses worldwide, but it is impossible to count all of them. Each year the number of gardens where the old roses appear also increases.
