## Project Overview

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**Tell us a little about your project. What are the main objectives of the project, and who will benefit from it?**

The Dream Center Life Recovery program is a residential recovery facility with a well-organized recovery program that helps young women overcome substance abuse, anger management and emotional struggles from their exposure to human trafficking. The Dream Center Rescue Project operates a facility for adult women (18-30) who have been rescued from human trafficking and sex slavery from the streets of Phoenix. The facility assists these victims from their first day of freedom, leading them through recovery which is a two-year program. The Dream Center facility has rooms, commercial grade kitchen, medical facility for treatment and counselling and an on campus high school GDE education facility.

This grant will fund the design, construction efforts and provide furnishings including beds, refrigerators, and microwave ovens needed to convert the old hotel facility three uninhabitable hotel rooms at the Phoenix Dream Center into safe havens. These rooms will be where victims of human trafficking can find refuge as they heal, rediscover their potential and rebuild their lives. The Dream Center supports the recovery from their first day of freedom, recovery from emotional and physical abuse with on campus medical facility and staff, education to achieve a high school education and a pathway to college and emotional recovery with processes to allow for their treatment from abuse and addictions.

These efforts, partnering with Dream Center, provide the funding necessary to rebuild these rooms. The costs for the room refurbishment range from \$11,000 to \$16,500 per room based on occupancy for one or two people. These costs include the design, engineering, construction materials and tasks (drywall, plumbing, electrical, HVAC, tiling, painting) and furnishings (beds, living room furniture, lamps, refrigerators, microwave ovens, TV, desks, rugs and bedding).

Our Grant is written to provide funding for three rooms and is for a total of \$44,000.00 USD.

## **Why did you choose to partner with this organization and what will its role be?**

Phoenix Dream Center (PDC) is part of a national set of human trafficking recovery centers across the United States. The PDC facility was started in 2008 and has been able to assist hundreds of victims of human trafficking with a recovery, drug rehabilitation, high school education and medical assistance. Victims of human trafficking either through recovery by law enforcement or through the Human Trafficking Hotline are entered into a 2-year recovery program.

Phoenix Dream Center maintains the facility, provides food, kitchen, medical support and counselling to the victims as part of their recovery. They will assume the costs of operations, maintenance, utilities and ongoing care of the rooms with their on-site staffing when Rotary has completed the remodeling efforts.

Phoenix Dream Center has 6 doctors on the Steering and Advisory Leadership Team to provide appropriate levels of support to the victims on the path to recovery including Behavioral Health, Education Advancement, Oral Health, Medical Health and Optomology.

Phoenix Dream Center has cooperative agreements that provide college scholarships for students to Arizona State University and Grand Canyon University.

The Host and local Rotarians will be involved in the engineering, design, procurement (local sourced), demolition, construction, interior design, purchasing of furnishing and installation of the components of the three rooms. Many of the activities will be inter-club hands on participation (with COVID guidelines). Additional activities will be off site including engineering, design, shopping, purchasing, trade coordination and project management. The Dream Center staff will be assisting with coordination, technical input and human trafficking sensitivity training. The Host Club will be maintaining the accounting, monitoring the independent checking account, hosting Zoom Meetings, preparing status reports and providing post project monitoring and reporting. The Host Club will prepare preliminary reports and final reports to the TRF.

### **Describe the role that international Rotarians will have in this project.**

The International Club will provide technical and writing assistance for the project. They will provide independent monitoring of Host Club and participants activities and will attend Zoom Meetings for status reporting. They will also assist in review of accounting, financial reports, status reports and final report review and concurrence.

## Sustainability

### Humanitarian Projects

#### Project planning

**Describe the community needs that your project will address.**

D5495 has started a Human / Sex Trafficking District Level Committee to engage clubs across our District to

become more involved in stopping Sex Trafficking. At the District level, we are approaching this program with three areas of concern. First – Awareness, we want to work with hotels, police, hospitals, bars and schools to inform younger people (the average age in AZ is 14 years old) about the dangers of the internet contacts in chat rooms. We also want to work with training hotel desk personnel, emergency room personnel and others that are a possible point of interface with a victim. Our second effort program is support of Victim Recovery and Rehabilitation. Many of the victims need therapy, drug rehabilitation and education as many of them dropped out of school at an early age. Finally, our third level of effort is to encourage Rotary support for legislation that will increase penalties for the crime of sex trafficking and help remove arrest for these young victims that were forced into prostitution. This program is a critical step in our District wide effort in addressing recovery and rehabilitation. This grant will help provide housing and recovery capability to victims trying to escape the human / sex trafficking realm. We expect Dream Center to impact 10 victims immediately and 60 or more victims over the next five years. This project created rooms that will last 10 years.

**How did your project team identify these needs?**

Our District level committee has taken classes (on line) and participated in human trafficking education lead by the RC of Verrado. Our knowledge level and interface with local law enforcement aimed our activities in the Recovery and Rehabilitation area of concern to Dream Center which has the highest successful recovery and rehabilitation rate in the Phoenix Metropolitan area.

**How were members of the benefiting community involved in finding solutions?**

Three clubs have participated in the early phases of the Human Trafficking efforts. In these efforts we were engaging training NGOs (TrustAZ), police departments (Buckeye and Scottsdale), churches, school district superintendents (Buckeye, Scottsdale) and District level committee discussions. Ideas and recommendations for supporting a variety of areas have been addressed but the focus on Recovery and Rehabilitation has repeatedly identified Phoenix Dream Center as an Area of Excellence.

**How were community members involved in planning the project?**

The District level committee and the RC of Scottsdale committee members have visited with the Dream Center management, facilities manager and recovering victims about the plans, ideas and timing for the room improvements. The room improvement concept was developed by these interviews and lead to the best solution for Dream Center to improve their capacity for supporting the victims.

**Briefly describe the other initiatives and how they relate to this project.**

We are working with Phoenix Dream Center, a non-profit 501 ( c ) 3 as well as many of our vendors are giving deep discounts and contributions of labor and materials in these efforts. We are also working at the District

level to include government agencies including law enforcement (police, Homeland Security, FBI), school districts, hospitals and hotel chains in our efforts for awareness and recovery processes. We are also working with RAGAS, the Rotary Action Group Against Slavery for insight and training materials.

**Please describe the training, community outreach, or educational programs this project will include.**

At the District level, we are viewing this as a 10 year effort including awareness training for multiple groups, including other group training efforts that are mature and well respected. We also are using publicly available materials from the Governors Office at the State of Arizona, Department of Homeland Security, Arizona State University studies to guide our efforts and provide respected materials for handouts. We are creating videos of our efforts and participation to share with our Rotary Club members and for community outreach. We are include students from our Interact and University clubs to encourage youth participation.

**How were these needs identified?**

The District 5495 Human Trafficking committee has worked with established human trafficking agencies at the State level with the Governors committee, local cities and county agencies including police departments, school districts and hospitals to determine the needs and the best applications for Rotary Clubs in our District 5495 to have the greatest impact. Phoenix Dream Center was one of the opportunities selected for District level commitments resulting in the identification with Phoenix Dream Center of their greatest needs and developing an approach and team members. This has resulted in this Global Grant application with broad District management and Club level support financially and with volunteer efforts.

**What incentives (for example, monetary compensation, awards, certification, or publicity), will you use, if any, to encourage community members to participate in the project?**

There is no incentives anticipated for financial compensation. We do have a planned publicity campaign supported by RC of Scottsdale and the District 5495 management team to increase club participation, increase awareness across the Phoenix metro area and to influence our state leadership with positive steps in eliminating human trafficking.

Phoenix Dream Center is internally funded and will continue the project after grant funded activities are concluded. This includes not only operation and maintenance of the facility and rooms but also the ability to provide continued support to the victims with their comprehensive program for recovery.

All supplies will be locally purchased. We have used a discounted cost model for procurement. This model used competitive rates for similar services discounted and, in some cases, donated items and services to allow for lowest price deployment.

We used competitive pricing models based on similar commercial services. The vendors were then asked to discount their services, labor, materials and supplies to reflect the nature of the humanitarian services being provided. Social media acknowledgment of their efforts and awards for their internal use are to be used to reward their efforts and discounts.

The on-going operation and maintenance is supported by a two-fold effort. The first level of effort is by incorporating the O&M plan into the engineering design providing maintenance accessible components and procurement of durable products in the selection processes to reduce the need for significant O&M efforts. The second level is provided by the Phoenix Dream Center, which has a maintenance staff that is involved in the design and implementation of the remodeling. This provides them insight, skills level training and knowledge of the system components allowing for competent support by the on-site staff to support the improvements long term.

**Describe how community members will maintain the equipment after grant-funded activities conclude. Will replacement parts be available?**

Phoenix Dream Center has been financially support since 2008 and have the ability to support the maintenance, provide maintenance staff and procure locally sourced, commercially off the shelf items needed to keep the facilities operational and well maintained.

There will be furnishings being supplied and there was market research done by the design volunteers with a user group of current residents of the facility that are undergoing recovery.
