






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The Overview of the Waterfront Trail highlighting Thunder Bay's Waterfront from Chippewa Park in the south to Fisherman's Park in the north










This map produced by the City of Thunder Bay shows the section of Waterfront Trail extension from just south of the Richardson Port Terminal to the north end of Prince Arthur's Landing very close to the existing playground.



This map produced by the City of Thunder Bay shows the section of Waterfront Trail extension from just north of the Northern Wood Preservers site, (now owned and operated by the Mid Continental Terminal) all the way to the bridge on Island Drive that crosses the Lakehead Region **Conservation Area's** Neebing-McIntyre Floodway. This 3.8 km section of the Waterfront Trail extension travels along Sleeping Giant Parkway, Maureen Street, Main Street and Island Drive. Negotiations need to occur with private landowners on sections of this Waterfront Trail.



This map produced by the City of Thunder Bay shows the 4.3 km. section of Waterfront Trail extension in the north from the bridge crossing the Neebing **McIntyre** Floodway to the Jackknife Bridge in the south.
