






Our guest speaker this week was our very own Colin Stanzione. As a new and valued member, Colin provided an insightful presentation on his fami-



Rotary clubs and partners built 222 toilets, six rainwater collectors, seven communal handwashing stations, and 20 biosand filters. The project provided more than 1,000 people with access to proper toilet facilities and almost 600 people with a regular supply of clean water. If you ask a Filipino living in a rural area of the Philippines where they go to the toilet, they will turn their head towards a non-specific direction and say "over there." This means that they use any location that gives them some sort of privacy to do their needs. Women generally have to go longer distances to avoid prying eyes and avoid assaults. In fact, when one talks to local community health workers about the risks of open defecation, they tell you about parasitic and bacterial infections while also emphasizing the high percentage of women harassed.

ferring back to Sydney into his current position in the South West in late 2022. Outside of ambulance, Liam enjoys cross-fit, hiking and have been a volunteer for 8 years at Tamarama SLSC as a life saver and medical educator.

Our Club hosted a Mental Health Forum and Expo on Saturday 23rd March 2024 at the Camden Civic Centre to raise community awareness of mental health issues.

The aim of the Mental Health Forum and Expo was to help to destigmatise mental illness; deliver information about mental health to people living in our community; improve the capacity for individuals to access relevant services; improve the capacity of individuals to care for

themselves if they develop a mental illness; increase community awareness about mental health; and build capacity within the community to give and get help. Mental health is a key component of the overall health and wellbeing of all Australians.

The Mental Health Forum and the Expo ran concurrently in different rooms at the Civic Centre with six speakers throughout the day covering topics across the mental health spectrum and 25 stalls by a broad range of mental health care support providers in the Macarthur area.

The speakers were Prof. Valsamma Eapen MBBS, PhD, FRCPsych, FRANZCP Chair of Infant, Child and Adolescent Psychiatry who spoke about the mental health of children from





Lyn Worsley, a Clinical Psychologist and Registered Nurse who spoke about resilience; Fred Purcell from Talk2MeBro who gave a very passionate presentation on suicide; John Kirkland from The Fathering Project whose presentation was titled "What Kids Need from their Dad'; Prof. Tony Jorm and Better Kitchener, the founders of the Mental Health First Aid program; and Dr. Steven Walker who spoke about mentoring programs and community-based activities aimed at addressing the associated behavioural disorders, attachment issues and mental health issues in children.

Friendly

Let us take time for a Camden 'Friendly FIKA'. Make time for family, friends and rotary colleagues to share a cuppa and chat.

This week, my focus on Reaching out to our Friends.

During adolescence, friendship was one long, uninterrupted conversation. These were the friends we talked to daily, both at school and at home via MSN and Facebook, sharing all manner of stories and personal insights with even though we'd see them again in less than a few hours. For some, such friendships have lasted throughout adulthood, while others have seen their friendship circles whittle down during adulthood, only to lose touch with those people that made their school years so entertaining, hilarious, and emotional.

The fact remains that as a society, we tend to place greater emphasis on those romantic connections in our lives. But the fact is, it's our friends that also get us through the hard times and these relationships are ones that should be nurtured and regarded as something significant and special.

Not surprisingly, new research suggests that such texts, phones and emails aren't just necessary to sustaining a good friendship, but are also greatly appreciated by your friends. According to a study published in the Journal of Personality and Social Psychology, check-ins from friends are greatly important.

Researchers did a series of experiments involving nearly 6,000 participants in order to explore the value of reaching out to someone "just because" or "just to catch up." Across all the various experiments and scenarios, researchers found initiators underestimated how much recipients appreciated the contact. It seemed that regardless of just how much time had elapsed between the two friends in terms of communication, a text simply checking-in was always welcome – particularly when the message was unexpected. According to lead study author, Peggy Liu, PhD, "There's research suggesting that when something positive happens to us, that amplifies the positivity of the experience and that receivers feel even more appreciative of being reached out to when they weren't expecting it."

Consider reaching out over Easter and make someone's day!!!!!
