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President's Message

Chris de Fraga, a fellow Rotarian made a return visit on Monday to provide an update on the current happenings of the car industry. He spoke of the features and safety concerns of the first vehicle from 1886 that was totally open, had no windscreen, had three solid wheels driven by belts and had only a lever for steering. He then compared the progressive advances in vehicles through to modern vehicles with autonomous breaking, lane monitoring, automatic lighting, keyless entry and self parking.

Chris showed short video clips of crash tests and resultant vehicle damage and structural defects at various speeds and angles of impact and other car manufacturers' safety features. It appears that providing the "A Pillar" stays intact the passengers are more protected especially in conjunction with seatbelts and airbags irrespective of the speed or point of impact. Volvo is currently developing an external pedestrian air bag to prevent the injuries resulting from impacts of the pedestrian's head into the bonnet.

Technology is pushing the limits of what's possible. Vehicle size and weight, electronics, catalytic converters, lighter materials and new construction methods are all playing their part. Computer chips have been used for many years and their functional control is rapidly increasing. However, many of us may have experienced or know of the effects on car functions when the computer malfunctions. The heaviness and/or loss of the steering is a very scary experience. On the other hand, vehicle servicing and problem detection and solving has increased with the use of the computer technology.

The pros and cons of the introduction of cars with more and more driverless features will need to be considered for some time to come. Legislation, regulations and insurance are all aspects that must be evaluated, debated and challenged. The amount of driver control, questions of safety, concerns about the security of the software including susceptibility to hacking, possible invasion of privacy due to sharing of information which includes location data are matters that will need to be considered.

Chris said that lessons may be learnt from the driverless fully remote controlled trucks used in the mining industries. They can be controlled from an operational centre many thousands of kilometres away. These can operate 24 hours a day on every day of the year with no need for 'driver' breaks due to fatigue, meals, sick day or holidays. It has been estimated that 500 man hours per year is saved on each truck. The same comments apply to driverless trains like those in the Vancouver metro system and elsewhere. Will automated systems be used for general deliveries and courier services?

Metchie attended our Monday meeting and had the opportunity to provide an outline of her very busy first month of her vocational training scholarship. She has visited our rainforest areas, VicForests in Ballarat, Beaufort, Cheerypool and elsewhere, HPV Plantations in Myrtleford, Shelley and Stanley. She has observed contractors at Daylesford, thinning trees and logging at Marysville in the area devastated by the 2009 bushfires. She has also seen the Metropolitan Recycling Centre and Westgate Park under the bridge.

It is interesting to note that HPV Plantations is a large private company owned by a combination of Australian, Canadian and US superannuation and investment funds. Each year HPV Plantations invests \$10 million in plantation sustainability and conservation management, plants over 7 million pine and eucalyptus trees. The company has over 700 staff and contractors who assist in the provision of logs for sawn timber, paper manufacture, panel board and treated round wood, as well as seeds, seedlings and cuttings.

We look forward to hearing of Metchie's future activities and wish her well with her Masters units at the University of Melbourne. Hopefully she will also be able to have a little R&R at some time! Thanks again to the Club members who are hosting Metchie.
