Our members were treated to a wonderful story of love as we were taken from California, to London, to Wellington in New Zealand, then France, and finally to Melbourne. Susan Biggar and her husband, Darryl, have three amazing sons, Aidan, Oliver and Ellis who have enriched their lives considerably. Aiden and Oliver both have cystic fibrosis (CF), a common genetic disease that affects the lungs and digestive system.

Susan's book, <u>"The Upside of Down"</u> is moving, inspiring and hilarious. We heard a few excerpts last Monday, and it is well worth a read.

It warms your heart to hear, "As our family took up running and sports with enthusiasm, I watched my sons skip their way into adolescence and surpass all expectations: competing in the state cross-country, track, swimming and surf lifesaving finals all in one year." Also, "Mum, I heard that Oliver and Aiden have some kind of medical condition that makes them run faster."

Sue was accompanied by Cale Wilkinson from the Murdoch Children's Research Institute, based at the Royal Children's Hospital in Parkville. Cale told us of the real difference the Institute is making to child health through world-leading research and disease prevention. They do so many things, but Cale was with us to support Susan, who is raising funds and awareness of CF through the 65km for Cystic Fibrosis walk on 14th March. We are encouraged to join in this event or support Susan as her sponsor.

This was a most interesting tour that was enjoyed by all those who attended.

## A Night for Your Diary - Monday 30th March

On Monday 30th March we have a very special guest speaker. Gemma Sisia has spoken to a wide range of audiences around the world. She has inspired people both young and old with her personal stories of her involvement with <u>The School of St Jude</u> in Tanzania. She tells how her belief in fighting poverty through education is now changing the lives of over 1,900 children and their families.

Gemma will be speaking about how she established The School of St Jude, just outside Arusha, in Tanzania. She will explain how a high-quality education was out of reach of most Tanzanian children and the reality of life without an education in East Africa.

The School of St Jude is one of a kind. What started 12 years ago with one teacher and three students is now a school with over 1,900 students, 350 local Tanzanian staff, three campuses and a fleet of over 20 school buses. Gemma will speak about how The School of St Jude is actively living out the mission of educating future leaders in Tanzania, not only for the students, but for staff and parents as well.
