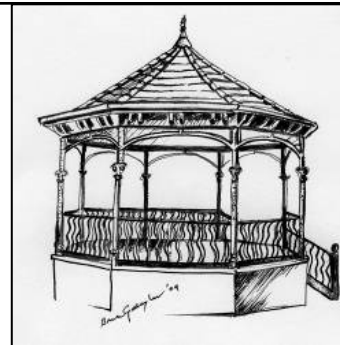

Amir Salehi talked about his arrival into Australia from Iran in 2006 on a working visa, and besides having the opportunity to reside in other countries, fell in love with Australia and stayed. Amir completed his Masters in Finance at RMIT and became a Financial Adviser, telling us some of the major issues with financial advisers, these being:

- Advisors must be genuinely independent and conflict free (less than 1% of advisers in Australia are completely independent).
- Be comprehensive.
- Be Values Based (concentrating on the client's deeply held values).
- He also explained why we shouldn't focus on return only but rather returns after fees and allowing for volatility.

The Next Speaker - Lydia Paterson

Lydia Paterson is CEO of Care Guidance which provides a platform for matching aged care providers with those who need care. The company handles all the paperwork and details, and determines the correct care for users across all available options.

Lydia has said there were two trends fuelling innovation in aged care. The first was the deregulation of the industry as the sector moves from a government driven system to a market based one where consumers have greater choice and control over services that affect them. The second trend is the Baby Boomers entering the aged care market in significant numbers over the coming decades.



Peninsular Health Donations to DIK

For the past five years, Peninsular Health has been donating medical equipment that can no longer be used in Australia to Rotary Donations In Kind, to send to medical facilities in third world countries.

Judi McKee, a Peninsular Health Clinical Risk Manager and a member of Frankston North Rotary is the one co-ordinating the hospital's donations to poverty stricken regions and war zones. In the past Peninsular Health has donated anaesthetic machines, operating equipment, hundreds of beds, over bed tables, lockers, paediatric cots, X-Ray machines, resuscitation material, walking frames, wheelchairs and kitchen items and many other items that have been invaluable in third world countries.

Recently a donation of equipment was sent to equip a new hospital being set up in the Philippines. Peninsular Health provided beds, ward furniture, and surgical equipment which will be put to good use. On the 19th January a Rotary DIK Team picked up 60 over bed tables and a variety of items such as out of date dressings and surgical equipment which no longer meets local health service requirements.
