President's Message

We probably had our Club's biggest meeting of the year with 60 people there. We had a great attendance by members, their partners and Friends of Rotary. We also had the visiting Group Vocational Exchange team from District 3820 in the Philippines. This District has special significance for our Club as it is within the geographic area that we have undertaken our medical missions for the last four years on the islands of Masbate and Mindoro. In addition, we had the Presidents of Rotary Clubs of Balwyn and Camberwell, Kevin Walsh and Nick Pane respectively, together with David Jones, the incoming President of the Rotary Club of Balwyn. We also had a visit from Sarah Prossor from the local Senior Rovers.

Many members have indicated that the night was a huge success with quite an excited "buzz" throughout the meeting.

The First Medical Mission

The theme of the evening was the report on our Twentieth Annual Medical Mission to the Philippines, held last October. Tony Simpson got us off on a good note by showing some photos of the first team of which he and his wife, Jennie, were team members. He also recounted that when the team was being trained by Jill Keefe on how to recognise a cataract, it was difficult to find people in Australia who had mature cataracts that the team would see in the Philippines. People in the Philippines having mature cataracts are almost totally blind and totally dependent on their extended family for daily living. Jill came to rescue and provided her dog for examination as he had quite advanced cataracts. It was quite a sight (an unfortunate pun!) to see this patient dog allowing team members to shine pen lights in his eyes.

The Orthoptist Students talk about the 2016 Mission

Our speakers for the night were Regina Yuen and Obi El-Ali. They were two of the four students that our Club sponsored for the Mission. While students at the time, they have now completed their studies and are working as qualified orthoptists. The other two students, Sarah Walters and Lachlan Wheelhouse-Knight, are now working as orthoptists in Adelaide and could not attend the evening. Regina and Obi gave a very interesting talk as they reflected upon the Mission and what that they go out of it. They indicated that they worked very hard, sometimes to 11pm in the evenings. However, they both found the experience amazing as they recognised their efforts were changing the lives of the poor from one of total dependence to one of independence. They were particularly impressed with our team ophthalmologists who were on several evenings operating until 2am in the morning. Maria Dimkopoulos, who came on the mission as a practicing orthoptist in Melbourne, also reflected upon the pleasure it gave her on the trip to be able to make such a difference in peoples' lives.

Both Regina and Obi shared their favourite patient stories of the Mission with us. Regina's story was about a young girl of about 9 years of age who was blind in one eye. This eye appeared to be much smaller that her good eye. She was very subconscious about the appearance of her smaller eye. Dr Mario investigated her condition and indicated that there was nothing he could do about the sight as the young girl was born with the condition. However, he could improve her appearance by replacing the smaller eye with an artificial eye. By coincidence he found that he had a suitable artificial eye in the bottom of his bag (as you would likely do!) that was of both the appropriate size and colour. The young girl had the eye inserted and her joy was wonderful to see as she examined her new appearance in a mirror. Obi's story was about an older gentleman who presented at the Mission and was apparently blind as he was using a stick to feel his way into a chair. He also had his shoes on the wrong feet, a clear symptom that not all was right with his vision. He had mature cataracts removed from both eyes. When he had the bandages removed and he could see he remarked to Obi, "Oh, you are a foreigner", which he had not appreciated previously due to his blindness. He also had his shoes on the right feet.
