Julie then shared her aspirations for the year ahead and said that the Mantra of the District 9800 leadership team is "It's all about the Clubs". She encouraged us all to share the Rotary story, adopt and act on 'a member a month campaign' and explore new ideas such as the Busy Feet Program that we are planning to implement this year. She and the District team will be visible and provide timely and practical support to all Clubs.

The signature events for this year include: the Purple Fingers for Polio campaign in October which is 'making children a part of the polio solution'; Social Inclusion Week in November; Rotary's 111th Anniversary on 23rd February 2016; Sharing a Club Selfie Moment where we all get together for a selfie photo; Women in Rotary Breakfast in March; Rotarians At Work Day; Group Vocational Exchange to the Philippines; and the Vocation Training Team to Cambodia with a Global Grant to enable four Aussie teachers to complete training in August and then to travel to Cambodia in January to train teachers in remote village schools.

Julie encouraged us to view the new Rotary District 9800 Facebook on facebook.com/rotarydistrict9800 and to tell our Club's Rotary story by submitting short Club posts and videos. She encouraged us to support cluster events and projects and suggested that we apply for Cluster, District and Global Grants which can greatly amplify the funding that we raise locally for our projects.

Julie's promotional phrase for the <u>2016 District 9800 Conference</u> is <u>"You'll Never Never Know if YOU don't Bendigo"</u>. Please let Peter May know of your intention to attend to hear extraordinary speakers, to make new friends and to just have fun.
