President's Message

Our presenters this week, Meyar and Joe Eidelson reminded us that family history is precious. We often don't think about the effects of this history being lost until older family members become frail or their memory start to fail, or even after they die.

Previously our only options were writing down the oral recollections of older members along with a few photos. New technology such as improved photography, sound recording via tape and cassette recordings, video, film and scanning techniques and more recently the applications of mobile phones, have help with recording family information. Various storage mediums have been used, including paper, film, video, floppy discs, CDs, DVDs. However, the reliable life span of digital mediums may be less than 10 years and in any case they all tend to be one off productions that cannot be readily updated to add further information. Also, I am sure all of us have some form of storage that is incompatible with the current versions of programs or boxes of old photographs that you were always going to sort through. Sometimes, you even completed the task of selecting the best shots and memories and now have photo collages on the wall or have albums collecting dust on the bookshelf after initially being shared.

The modern approach is to create a private online interactive multimedia archive that is stored in "the Cloud" for your family members and friends to view, to share and to develop your history. This modern approach can be provided through family.silverchronicle.com.au, where family history is a dynamic and living documentation by family members and friends. It can provide an

interactive way to view and share memories, to upload documents, interviews and family photos at any time, for any topic or for any occasion. The security is controlled by designated family members who provide passwords to those family and friends they consider appropriate. Various levels of interaction within the online site can also be controlled from read only through to the ability to add and edit information. There is no limit on the size but restrictions apply to monthly data input.

The Next Speaker - John Pesutto MP

In 2014 John Pesutto was elected as the Member for Hawthorn in the Victorian Legislative Assembly and was immediately appointed Shadow Attorney General.

John's parents were Italian immigrants who arrived separately in Australia in the early 1960s without much more than their personal possessions and no formal education. John's dad worked on the power stations in the Latrobe Valley and his mum worked in the local shoe factory. John owes much to them for the values instilled in him and his four siblings. Values like integrity, honest effort and initiative, as well as generosity of spirit.

John graduated from the University of Melbourne with degrees in Law and Commerce. Spending most of his professional life in the private sector practicing law, John has successfully run his own small business.



End Polio Now

Our Rotary International President, K. R. Ravindran, reports that the 11 August 2015 marked a tremendous milestone - one full year without a single case of polio caused by wild poliovirus in Africa.

The magnitude of this achievement can be hardly overstated. A polio-free Africa has been within sight, so near and yet so far, for over a decade. Tens of thousands of health workers reached hundreds of millions of children with the vaccine. Yet this progress is still fragile. As long as endemic polio exists in Pakistan and Afghanistan, the virus still has the potential to spread and spark new outbreaks. Together we need to keep polio front and centre in our communities and on our national agendas.

The battle for Africa has, for the moment, been won, but we need every Rotarian to help win this war. Together, we will <u>End Polio Now</u> and truly *Be a Gift to the World*.
