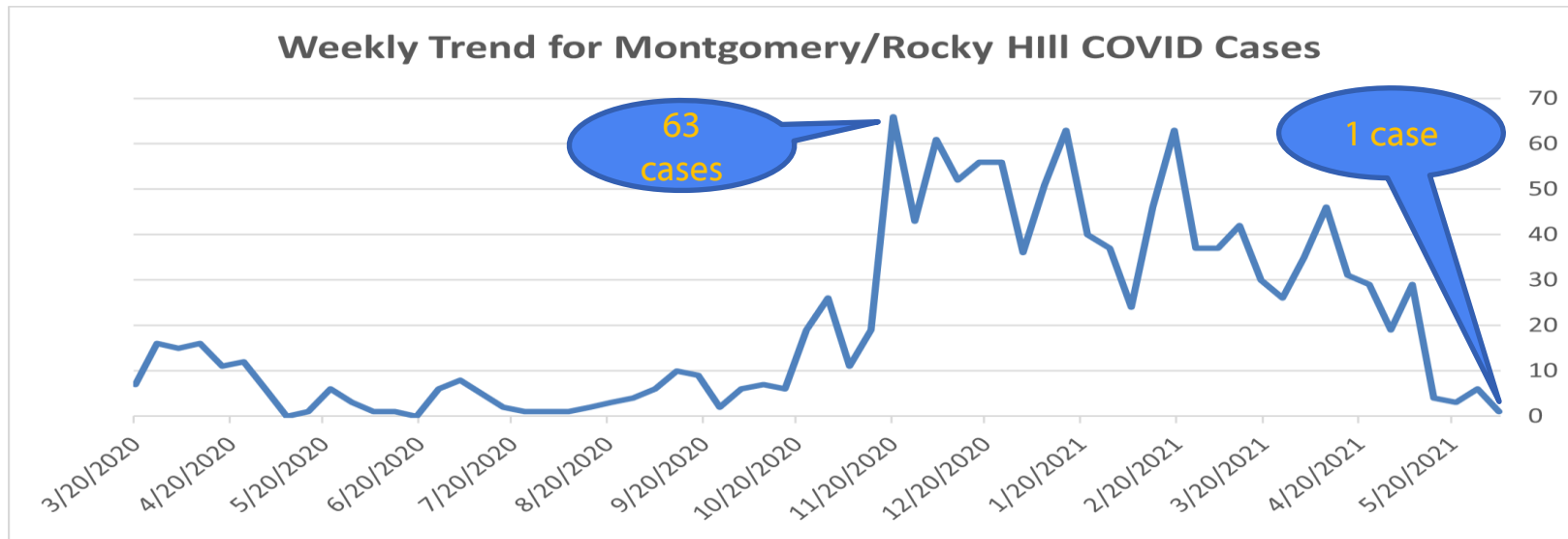
Montgomery Twp. Department of Health

- Montgomery Township Department of Health (MTDH) is 1 of 3 municipal departments in New Jersey with national public health accreditation
 - Also, Princeton and Bloomfield
- MTDH has contracts to provide services to nearby municipalities
 - Rocky Hill, Pennington, Hopewell Borough
- Montgomery Twp. has invested in the COVID-19 Response
 - Doubled public health staffing
 - Acquired refrigeration for Moderna
 - Expense to be reimbursed by grants



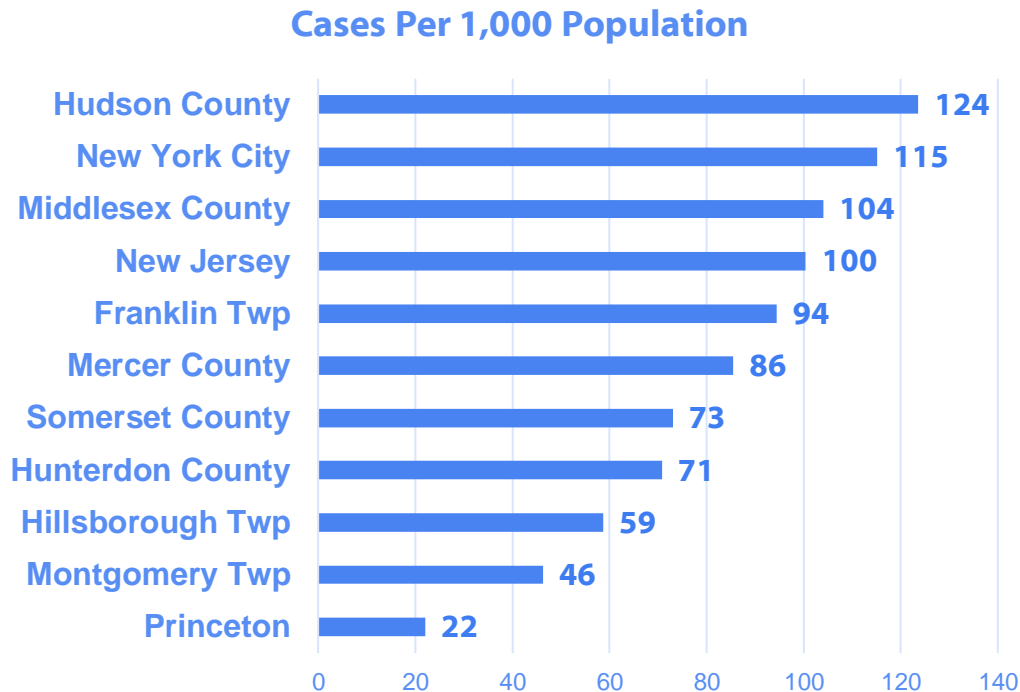
Winter Was the Most Challenging Locally

- We saw several weeks with 60+ Cases between November and February



Overall, Montgomery Did Comparatively Well

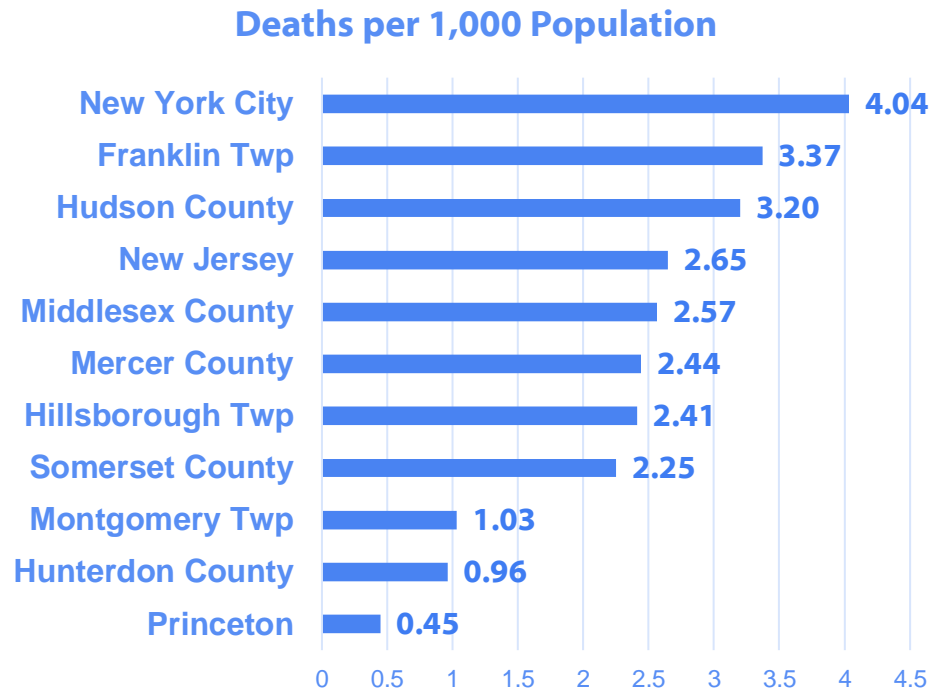
- Montgomery had 46 cases per 1,000 population, much better than other nearby areas.
- We did twice as well as the state overall
- Key factors were
 - Cooperation with contact tracing and health guidelines
 - Many residents able to shift to working from home
 - Relative affluence
- Princeton did even better with 22 cases per 1,000

How We Doing in Montgomery, Rocky & Hill

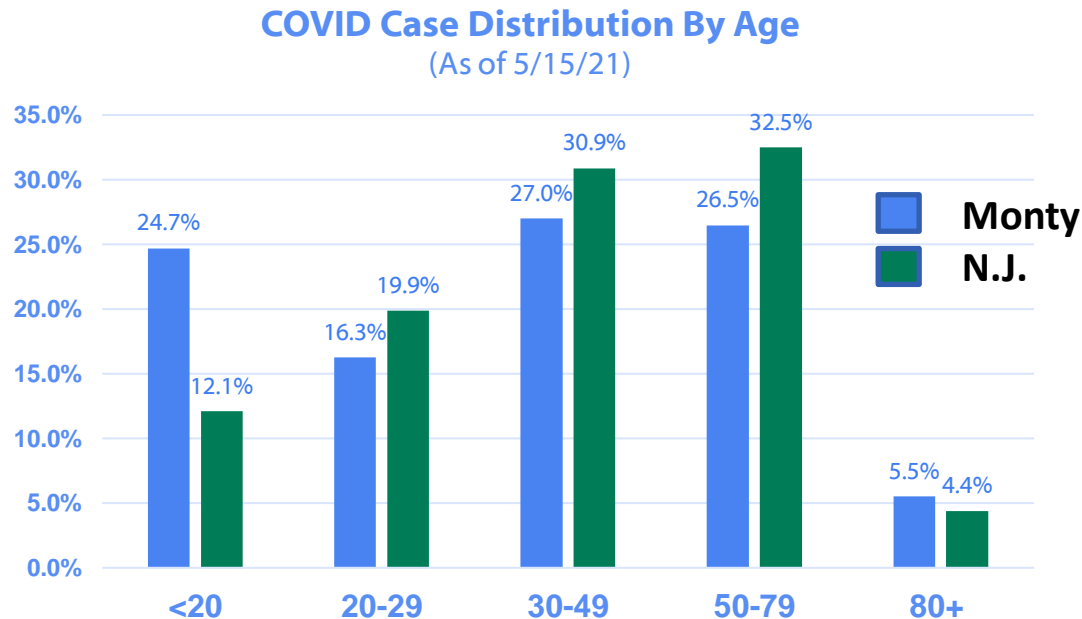
- Sadly, Montgomery had 24 deaths and Rocky Hill had 1
- Most deaths were at the Stonebridge senior facility
 - Other towns have multiple facilities of similar type, which probably drove higher numbers of deaths per capita
- Princeton fared the best locally

Montgomery Cases Skewed Young

- Montgomery had many more cases among youth compared to the state overall.
- Many of these cases came in clusters from youth sports activities
- Older residents represented few cases but a majority of deaths.



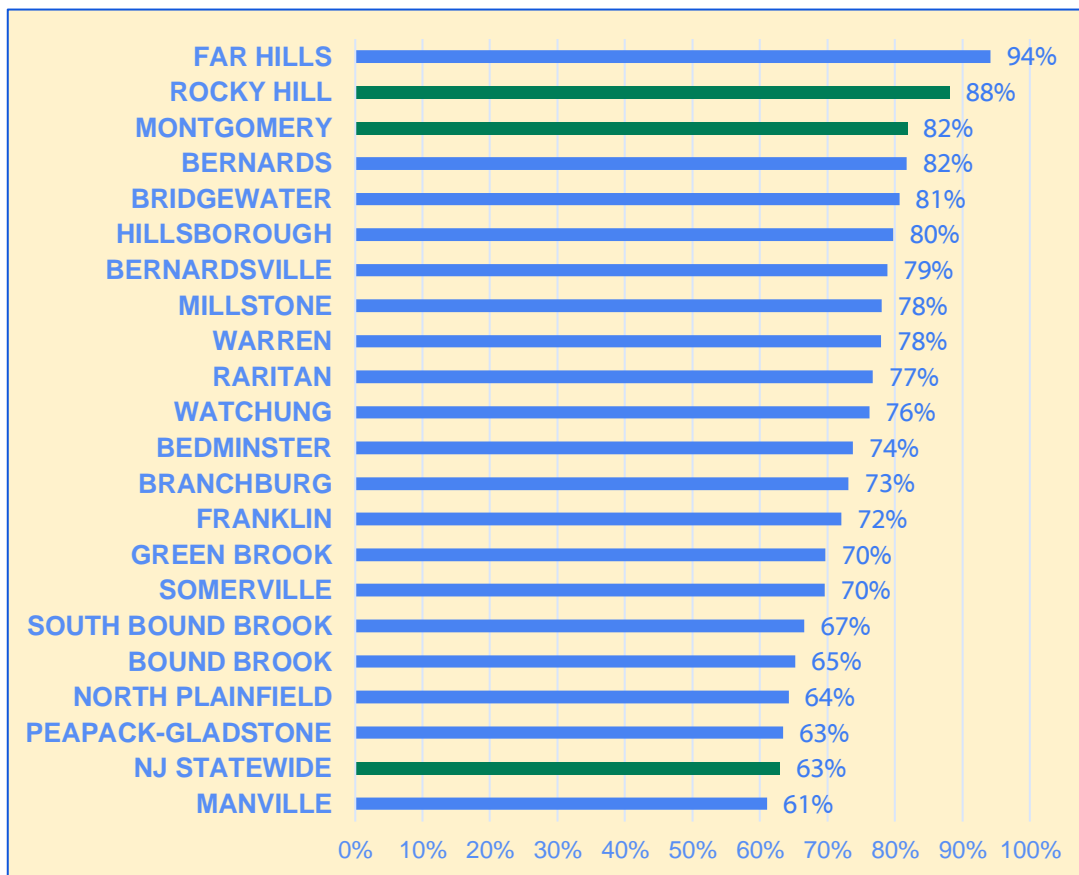
Note: NJ's youngest age grouping does not include 18- to 19-years old.

We Are Doing Well with Vaccinations

- 82% of Montgomery adults had 1+ dose by June 1
 - 71% have completed course of vaccinations
- Rocky Hill even higher at 88%
 - 79% have completed course of vaccinations

At Least One Dose as of 6/1/21

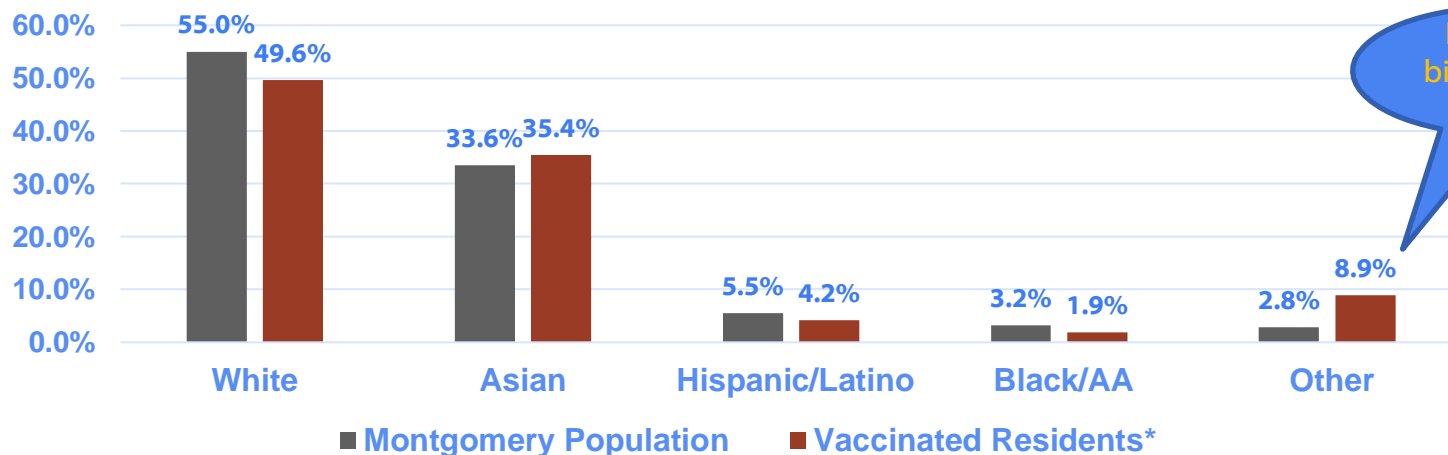


VACCINE EFFORT REACHING MOST GROUPS

- Efforts to be intentional in targeting diverse groups has succeeded.
- A key factor has been hiring a vulnerable population coordinator

We Are Not Satisfied!



- Our goal is to get close to 100% vaccination in Montgomery and Rocky Hill
 - 18% of our adults still need to receive their initial dose
 - We have only begun to vaccinate our children, with approval of Pfizer for children 12 and older
 - Younger children likely to follow in fall
- A key issue is helping “hesitant” residents to get vaccinated

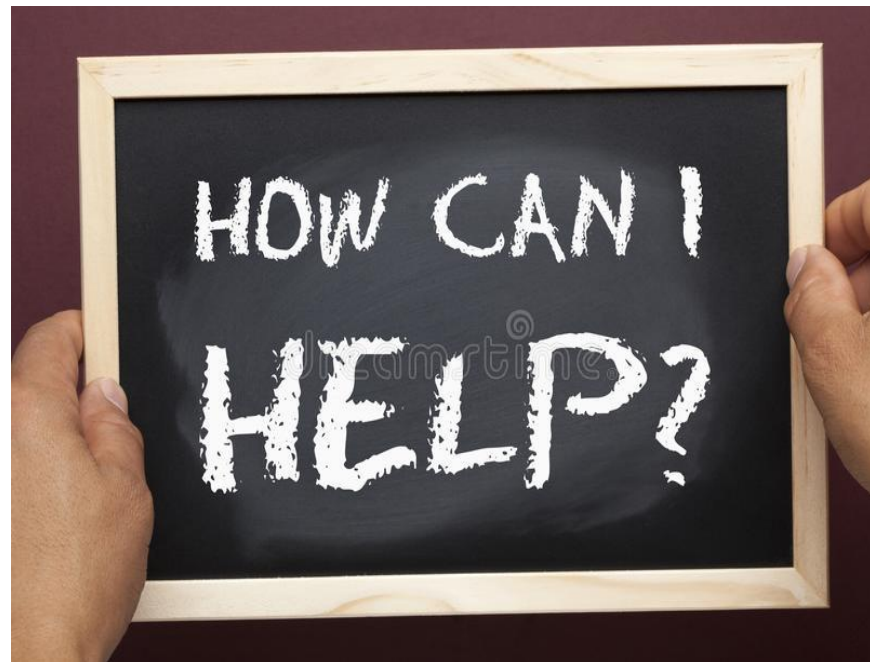
How We Reach the Hesitant

- Many people are naturally hesitant to try new medical treatments
- And we are coping with disinformation about the vaccines
- The most important channels of communication are trusted people
 - Family & friends
 - Personal physicians / other health professionals
 - Faith leaders
 - Community leaders



How You Can Help as a Community Leader

- Listen for signs of hesitancy
 - I'm not sure about it
 - I haven't gotten around to it yet
- Ask supportive questions
 - What have you heard that concerns you?
 - What arguments in favor of vaccination have you considered
- Explain your own decision process
 - Wanting to see parents/grandchildren
 - Not wanting to worry you might pass the virus to a loved one
 - Wanting to get back to normal



Local Evidence Can Be Persuasive

- 82% of Montgomery adults have received a vaccine, and none have had a serious negative reaction
- Not a single Montgomery resident who has been fully vaccinated has subsequently tested positive for COVID-19 (although it happens)
- Montgomery is leading other communities in getting vaccinated, which helps everyone stay safe
- The Montgomery Health Department is offering to answer questions by phone, and is holding local clinics



Help Us Make Connections!

- We want to meet with local groups to answer questions and address concerns

 - We'll do a "pop up" clinic!



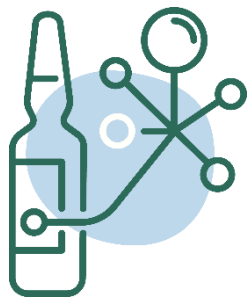

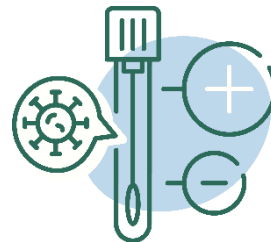
