

WATER

March is Rotary Water and Sanitation Month

Access to clean drinking water has been a major concern for many countries around the world. According to the World Health Organization (WHO) and United Nations Children's

Fund (UNICEF), approximately 2.2 billion people lack access to safe drinking water However, there are no countries in the world that have absolutely no drinking water at all.

There are some countries that are facing severe water scarcity issues, which makes access to drinking water a significant challenge. For example, in Yemen, the ongoing conflict has led to the destruction of water infrastructure, leaving millions of people without access to safe drinking water. Similarly, in Somalia, drought and conflict have contributed to water scarcity, with many people relying on contaminated water sources.

Other countries that have been facing water scarcity include India, where millions of people lack access to safe drinking water due to poor water management and infrastructure. In addition, many countries in sub-Saharan Africa, including Ethiopia, South Sudan, and Chad, have been facing significant water scarcity issues due to natural factors such as droughts and climate change, as well as poor infrastructure and management practices.

Through these efforts, Rotary International and its partners have helped to provide access to clean water to millions of people around the world.

In addition to constructing water wells, Rotary International also works to promote sustainable water management practices, such as rainwater harvesting and water conservation. This helps to ensure that water resources are used efficiently and effectively and can help to mitigate the effects of water scarcity in areas where it is a concern.
