PRESIDENT'S ANNUAL REPORT 2017-2018



For me it has been an exciting year and I have come to realise that within a club there are many people in fact all members who are contributing to the success of the club. ACTION PLAN

We did start the year with a full set of action plans and I can happily say we have pretty much stuck with these aims and objectives and fulfilled the plan. With this in mind I would like to go through our committee's performances during the year.

Fundraising - Director John Spiteri

Our fund raising plan was set to an optimistic aim of raising 20 thousand during the year.

This aim has been achieved and at the time I am writing this report we still have another event to go but note that we have already passed the set goal. This is a big Well Done to John Spiteri and his committee. Of course I cannot keep this in isolation to the support he has had from all of our members and also include the friends of the club. Particularly for the big events

The Waurn Ponds BBQ alone raised \$7500

Extra BBQs Torquay and Wallington raised another \$2000

Three Bay FM events = \$1723

Ariston House = \$1000

Our major event for the Christmas party for the COGG was and is always our big fundraiser and it raised over 9,000

Lastly and I think pretty importantly we conducted a BBQ for the Rainbow Pride Festival. This is the LGBTIQ people who had quite an impacting year surrounding their Same Sex Marriage campaign during the plebiscite for SSM rights. The Geelong Rainbow Inc. is about supporting those people who are struggling with their identity which can result in psychological issues

MEMBERSHIP PR AND FUN - DIRECTOR JO WHITE



I now must highlight one of the big changes that we have made to our club this year. We have changed from our normal week in week out meetings to looking at what we think is necessary on a monthly basis and organising our time around this. To this end we have removed one meeting, the first Tuesday of the month and replaced it with just a board meeting with other members having a week off. This was a significant change and although still only early days I am receiving many indications that this was a positive move. We have also changed the third Tuesday of every month to a social event. I now look to our Member PR and Fun group for filling this space in with an event. Mostly it was a trip to a restaurant but this was also mixed with a Movie night and mini golf. Both were very entertaining and on a fun basis pretty successful. Again the feedback to me was positive.

We have been lucky to have a new member this year which made up for our loss of Christine Sims, for personal reasons, so we have a numbers neutral year on members.

Lastly on the PR field this group have worked tirelessly. They were instrumental in promoting Geelong Rotary on the foreshore. Also they have been working in the background by creating publications and plans and taking on anything that might give our club a little notoriety.

We did have items in the Geelong Advertiser on a couple of occasions.

COMMUNITY AND VOCATIONAL - DIRECTOR JUDY BEASLEY

This year we have continued on our way of supporting so many things within our community.

I have to thank Judy Beasley and her team for keeping these projects happening

We introduced support for a new foundation in Geelong called Peace of Mind Foundation. This group have formed to support those people and families who are adversely affected by brain tumours. This can be very devastating for those involved. There is a drain on physical resources of immediate families and also the support groups. This group of amazing people have to deal with the loss of many newly made friends. This is an emotional drain that cannot be described.



We have continued our support for the Barwon Health Volunteer Patient Transport Program and for the Christchurch Community Meals Program.

We joined the Rainbow Pride festival to endorse our support for raising self-confidence within LGBTIQ Community,

The many other groups/issues we supported are mental illness, the Cancer Council and Literacy in schools.

Peter Hynes our new president has continued his support of Bowel Testing in the prevention of Bowel Cancer

Other groups we have supported this year include Freshwater Creek Fire Brigade and Support after Suicide. We also provided a BBQ for an opening of a Chiropractic Centre in Belmont.

It is great to see that with so few members we have had so much impact within the community.

We had an interesting year when looking at the vocational contacts. We had the right honourable Andrew Katos speak to our club. We had Dr Kim Lim a Chiropractic Vet. We had Dr Mark Tizard speak on his speciality science area which was about sexing chickens. We also had Zoe Walker talking about the Barwon Health Transport Vehicle.

YOUTH - DIRECTOR JUDY EYLES

I now look to our youth committee to note that so much has happened in this area.

Judy has taken "her Kids" and helped them apply and achieve a goal.

Emma Zanghi is now almost half way through her year in Germany. Although she is currently on crutches I believe she is making the most of her opportunity to learn cultural differences and to understand and know people from other countries with her Youth Exchange

Our NYSF student Tom Broadman who was fairly excited before going to the science forum in Canberra, he seemed hardly able to contain himself with superlatives on return he loved it so much. Actually he thought so much of this program that he is now going to IYSF which is a science forum in London



We also sent a Claire O'Callaghan to RYLA (Rotary Youth Leadership Awards) for a week. This is a program that encourages young individuals to learn leadership abilities. The feedback is that she learnt so much. She will be presenting to the club soon.

Lastly for RAIC we sent Anthony Zanghi who is our Exchange student Emma's brother to Canberra. The reports are that he learnt so much and was also very excited with the experience.

INTERNATIONAL - DIRECTOR JANE MYERS

There has had quite an emphasis on a combined approach to overseas projects and to that end Jane Myers has been meeting with the Geelong group of Foundation/International Directors to



organise a combined project. This is still progressing with ideas ranging from Solar pumps in Tanzania, a community training centre in Kenya, water projects in PNG a health centre in Vanuatu and a school in the Congo. These are all valued projects but will take some time to work through to get them started. I wish this group every success

I must now highlight the work that Telsa and her group of people have been doing for "Days for Girls". This project provides reusable sanitary packs for

girls. Since girls in some third world countries cease their school education due to the lack of sanitary options while at school. It is interesting to note that for each girl the impact for her would be enormous. Well done Telsa and your group!

We have again donated money to purchase a ShelterBox. I have had a long involvement with ShelterBox and note that the organisation has since 2000, helped more than one million people rebuild their lives.

Simon and myself as ambassadors have setup a "Hypothetical" presentation/training/information session which we believe has been successful. There was also a presentation to Probus.

FUNDRAISING COMMITTEE ANNUAL REPORT - 2017-2018

Fundraising Committee:

John Spiteri – Director John Virgona Brian Burch

The fundraising budget set for the 2016-17 Rotary was in the order of \$16,000. This target was exceeded in that year by approximately \$3,100. In view of the result achieved in that year, it was decided by the RCBG Board to "lift the bar" so to speak and increase the fundraising budget, for the 2017-18 Rotary Year, to \$20,000. This increase in income would enable the Club to



meet the Club's usual Community/Vocational Services, Youth, Membership and Foundation projects and provide an opportunity to fund other worthwhile community service projects not previously undertaken due to limited funds.

Based on Club Treasurer David Fisher's Interim Financial Report for the period 1st July 2017 up to 10th June 2018, the Gross Takings from BBQ and Catering Events was in the order of \$25,313 and, together with the income from the RC of Ballarat South Car Raffle and the sale of Entertainment Books (in the order of \$560), the Fundraising Committee is pleased to report that after operating expenses, the fundraising target proposed for the 2017-18 Rotary Year has been exceeded by about \$361 to around \$20,361 (i.e. approximately 2% above our 2017-18 fundraising target of \$20,000).

This achievement for a club of around 17 members is, we believe, a significant outcome.

Note: – As mentioned above, the profit result was achieved primarily from BBQs and event catering together with income from the sale of tickets for the Rotary Club of Ballarat South car raffle (profit of approx. \$308) and the sale of Entertainment Books (profit of approx. \$252). Income from other Committee Group initiatives such as Centurion, fellowship nights, fines and the weekly wine raffle also contributed in achieving an overall fundraising budget target in excess of \$20,000.



A significant factor that contributed to the excellent result this year was the regular BBQs held at the Bunnings Waurn Ponds (mainly Fridays) venues and the additional BBQs through the Geelong Bay FM organisation. Unfortunately, we lost what was a regular monthly gig at Bunnings Torquay. This was due to the Bunnings management policy which precluded us from being able to have BBQs at more than one Bunnings venue. Hence, we now only have Bunnings Waurn Ponds as a regular venue. We have declined further BBQs at the Mitre 10 Store in Wallington

as the return for effort from this venue has made it uneconomical to continue (we believe that the opening of the Bunnings store in Leopold may have had an influence in poor results from the Mitre 10 Wallington venue).

Our other major source of income from BBQs and catering events this year has been from venues at the Ariston House Child Minding Family BBQ and the City of Greater Geelong staff Christmas Party. A summary of the Gross Takings (up to 1st June 2018) from the various venues is shown below:

A successful fundraising year has once again enabled our Club to donate and sponsor many and



various projects and programs including the Christ Church Community Meals Program, Youth Exchange, TRF Polio Eradication, NYSF, Literacy programs at various state schools in Geelong, Shelterbox, Barwon Health Patient Transport Vehicle, Strive 2 Thrive Cancer Support Program, Donations in Kind, Freshwater Creek Fire Brigade and many others.

Highlights for the Year:

- Our most significant fundraisers were again the COGG Christmas catering (combined with the COGG's Ariston House Child Care) and Bunnings Waurn Ponds netting approx. \$8,250 and \$8,023 respectively. We had tremendous support from members and friends of Bayside volunteering their time to assist with this fundraiser and would not have been such a success without all of those volunteers involved. Of general interest, the COGG Catering event this year was set up in the larger of the two basketball courts at The Arena as this provided COGG organisers with more space for children's activities and more seating area. However, if Bayside get the opportunity to cater for this function again, we should request the use of the amply equipped kitchen facility in the main building as
 - catering in the larger basketball court did provide some challenges which we managed to overcome.
- The Club tried out the two new Rotary signage marquees at the Ariston House

and Geelong Rainbow Inc. fundraising functions. The marquees were purchased through a grant received from the Victorian Department of Health & Human Services as part of a State wide Shade Grant Program in 2016-17.

- Our Rotary Club was involved in a fundraiser for Geelong Rainbow Inc. following the Pride March by the LGBTQI community, which ended in Johnstone Park. Funds raised would help GRI in providing support and counselling services for the LGBTIQ community in Geelong.
- We have been very fortunate this year in getting some very profitable BBQs through Geelong's Bay FM radio station. We were recommended for these BBQs by David Fisher's daughter, who works for Bay FM.
- Hopefully, we will get further opportunities going into the next Rotary year.
- Ongoing participation in the Christchurch Community Meals Program with a large percentage of our members and friends of Rotary participating each time the club is rostered to assist in the preparation and distribution of a hot cooked meal to those in need in the Geelong community.
- Thanks again to the generosity of Robin and Andrea Hunt for providing a home for the club BBQ trailer and storage of all associated equipment.
- Thanks also to our New Generation friends Mark Furlan, Emma Zanghi (and her friends Johanna & Sarah), her brother Anthony, Tom Boardman and Emily Kinross-Smith who gave of their time at various BBQs throughout the year. Having the younger generation around added fun to our activities and perhaps gave them an appreciation of what's involved in raising funds for the Youth Programs the Club supports.

The Community and Vocational Services Committee has worked hard to 'Make a Difference' during the year with many great outcomes.



Community Service Projects

Barwon Health Volunteer Patient Transport Program

The RC Bayside Geelong, along with a number of other rotary clubs in the Geelong area, is into its third year of financial support for the Barwon Health Volunteer Patient Transport Program. This wonderful program transports thousands of people in need each year to their medical appointments and treatments. Four vehicles operate 364 days per year, ferrying 1600 patients per year and average 54,000 km per year each. Our wonderful member, Jo White, continues to be a volunteer driver with the program.

This year the club contributed \$1500 towards the upkeep of the four patient transport vehicles.

Geelong Christ Church Community Meals Program

The RC Bayside Geelong continues to support the Geelong Christ Church Community Meals Program.

Members volunteer their services on a quarterly roster on the first Monday of the month, which was coordinated by PP John Spiteri. Our members assist with setting up the dining room, meal preparation and serving of the meals as well as cleaning up afterwards. Up to 100 meals can be served on the night to those in need in our Geelong community. The club has continued its financial support of the program with a pledge of \$1500.

Literacy in Schools

The RC Bayside Geelong continued its Literacy support for six Geelong secondary Schools by providing a Literacy Award in the form of a \$50.00 book voucher from Dymocks Bookstore. The schools involved are Belmont High School, Geelong High School,



Grovedale Secondary College, Newcomb Secondary College, Oberon High School and Western Heights Secondary College. The Award is presented to a student who has displayed excellence in literacy or would benefit from this award to improve their literacy skills. This year I was privileged to attend the Belmont High School Presentation Day at Costa Hall, in December 2017, where I had the honour to present the literacy award to a year 9 student, Lewie Page, a very worth recipient.



Preserve Planet Earth Tree Planting Challenge

This year we were challenged by the Rotary International President, Ian Riseley, for every Rotarian around the world to plant a tree which will total 1.2 million trees, to celebrate Earth Day and assist in solving environmental issues. The RC Bayside Geelong is combining with Highton RC, with assistance of the City of

Greater Geelong, in late June/early July to plant 1500 trees along the Waurn Ponds Creek area.

End Trachoma 2020

This year the District Governor Ray Herbert's wife Deirdre, asked every club in District 9780 to support the End Trachoma 2020 Project that is being organised by the RC Melbourne in conjunction with their 100 years as a rotary club. Trachoma is a debilitating eye condition which is prevalent in our indigenous communities and with our help can be easily eradicated. The RC Bayside Geelong happily donated \$1,000 towards this project.

Australia's Biggest Morning Tea to Support the Cancer Council

A Morning Tea was held in May by PP Judy Beasley, to raise much needed funds to make a difference in the fight against cancer. 1 in 2 Australians are impacted by cancer by the age of 85. Twenty-Two lovely ladies and gentlemen attended and enjoyed a delicious morning tea. They were very generous in their support, playing games and activities along with a monster mystery raffle. \$405.00 was raised from the morning tea and thanks must go to all who donated food and raffle prizes. It was a wonderful effort by all.

Lift the Lid on Mental Illness / Australian Rotary Health

On "Hat Day" last October, members were asked to wear a hat and give a gold coin donation. Members were also encouraged to buy a beanie from RC Drysdale's beanie Drive, to "Lift the Lid" on Mental Illness, which raised \$90 on the night. The club increased the donation to \$200 and a further \$300 was donated to Rotary Health Australia.

Geelong Rainbow INC.

The RC Bayside Geelong ran a successful BBQ in support of the Geelong Rainbow INC. special "Celebration Day" and Walk, held at Johnstone Park, with profits from the BBQ donated to Geelong Rainbow INC.

New Chiropractic Clinic

The RC Bayside Geelong was invited by Bay FM, to run a BBQ at the opening of a new Chiropractic Clinic in Belmont, in February. Although not a huge money raiser, it was a good community support activity and was getting the name of Rotary out into the community.



Bowel Scan Month - May

The RC Bayside Geelong through Rotarians Peter Hynes (Secretary of the District 9780 Bowel Scan Committee) and Jo White have been assisting with the distribution of the Rotary Bowel Scan Kits to pharmacies through the Geelong area. Our members have been encouraged to "purchase a kit and do the test" during May – Bowel Scan month.

Sock Drive for the Homeless

In May, the 15 Geelong rotary clubs were challenged to "Make a Difference" by purchasing and donating a pair of men's/women's socks to help our homeless community members. The RC Bayside Geelong rose to the challenge and we have donated a large amount of socks for the Salvation Army to distribute to the homeless shelters around Geelong.

Others

The RC Bayside Geelong has continued to financially support a number of local groups in the Geelong Community including Freshwater Fire Brigade (\$500), Peace of Mind Foundation (\$1,000), Support after Suicide (\$500), Brain Cancer (\$500), to name but a few.
