## Making the News...



Werribee's Barry Cooper says it is a good thing for retired people to give back to the community. Mr Cooper started volunteering at Little River Primary School at the beginning of the year, after retiring from his job as a professor of accounting at Deakin University.

He volunteers on a weekly basis through EdConnect Australia, to help pupils in grade 3 and 4 with their class work. Mr Cooper said the students he volunteers with are

about the same age as his grandchildren.

"I think the kids appreciate someone who can link with them and emphasise, be comfortable with them and explain things to them," he said. "The kids just want someone who will listen to them and provide a little encouragement. "You can be a retired plumber or a retired professor, it doesn't make a difference - the kids don't mind as long as you can help them." Mr Cooper said he believed children at the Little River school also enjoyed having a male role-model, with only one male teacher and a male principal working at the school. "It's a lovely school with a great culture, you can feel it when you walk in," he said. "I remember when I first drove into Little River, I hadn't been there for some years. It was like a country town like Werribee used to be - it was like going down memory lane." Mr Cooper said he would encourage other Wyndham residents to think about volunteering. "This has been a really enjoyable experience for me and I highly recommend it," he said. ## Rotary Meeting 18th May 2021




In the absence of President Sue (battling severe influenza) President Elect Beryl opened the meeting.

Our Club will be acknowledged in the new building.


#### Announcements/ Committee Updates






#### Ray French:

## Rotary Meeting 25th May 2021



Chair *Anne Kavanagh,* called Members and guests to order and gave the Invocation, before asking President Sue to Welcome everyone.

Pres Sue welcomed Anne's return from leave and in particular the Guest Speaker David Tudor of Bendigo Bank and Henry Brockman the President of (Kardinia ???). Sue noted that recent meeting had been attended by various Members including Presidents of other Rotary Clubs from the District and encouraged Members to reciprocate. Member Fred LeDeux suggested this would be more easily done if everyone was provided the names, dates, times, and venues of Clubs' meetings – noting that the "Blue Book" had provided this information, but was no longer available.

**Frank Thompson** encouraged Members to attend the Plaque unveiling ceremony commemorating Rotary Club of Geelong's long, proud and successful history with the Jail during which some \$1.5M was raised and contributed to community projects. The unveiling is scheduled for 10.00am on Saturday 5th June in the forecourt of the main Jail entrance.



**Helen St John** advised that t There are still four places available for the 1st Wasted Dinner on Friday, 4 June 2021 at 7.30pm. The 2nd Wasted Dinner on Friday, 9 July 2021 is fully subscribed. Helen also promoted attendance and early registration for the Annual Change-over Dinner at Capri at 6.30/7.00pm on 29th June at \$45/person.

Sue noted that the husband of Di Crawford was to be buried at 10.00am on Friday 28th May and those interested could view the service on-line through Tuckers Funeral Services.

Anne Kavenagh then introduced the Guest Speaker David Tudor, the Regional Manager of Bendigo Community Bank

David has an impressive 35 year employment history with the Bank, having held numerous Executive roles during that period and with support of his wife and two adult children.

David spoke of some key aspects of the Bank probably best captured by his statement that it was an institution "not about Banking, but more about the Community". Supported by various graphics and visual slides, David explained that the Bank had a 160+ year history, having evolved from the Capital Building Society in 1992 following which it became a Bank in 1995. With over 2 million customers and


7 thousand employees, the Bank enjoys an enviable reputation which places it in the top 20 most trusted brands in the country. It is a top 100ASX listed Company, with 110,000 shareholders with a key focus on stakeholder needs.

A feature of Bendigo Bank is its ongoing substantial commitment to the (Geelong) Community illustrated by its philanthropic donations of \$14M over the past 20years, while contributing \$50M to local shareholders. It has 17 Branches in Geelong with 200 staff, serving 84,000 customers. Its revenue is shared 50/50 with Communities, with 80% of profits directed to the Community.

David predicted:

- Low interest rates to continue
- Housing market to increase
- Job market to improve
- Continued growth in Regional districts

Overall, he voiced positivity and projected continued buoyancy for the Bank and its engagement with the Community – especially in the Greater Geelong Region.

During question time, he noted that

- the Banking Royal Commission resulted in ensuring no commission payments are being paid to Banking Staff,
- low interest needs to acknowledge safety of deposits VS returns
- unlikely to see significant growth in establishment of new Bank branches
- inevitability of more cash-less transactions and reduced face to face engagement

Anne Kavenagh thanked David for his presentation with a small gift gesture and acknowledged Bendigo Bank for its Community contributions and focus which mirrored Rotary Club of Geelong's own philosophy with supporting the community and which reflects our use of Bendigo Bank.

Meeting was concluded by President Sue and with Helen winning the Entry Voucher.
