I recently had the opportunity to visit Cecelia in Evanston. Cecelia is the person in Evanston that works directly with us in our Global Grants, and some of you may recognize her name. Cecelia has been a Regional Grants Officer in the Rotary Grants area of The Rotary Foundation since 2013. Cecelia began her career at Rotary as a humanitarian grant coordinator, providing assistance with the successful close-out of the Matching Grant and District Simplified Grant

D5240 Polio Plus 2018-2019

Rotary's Polio Plus program is going into it's 32nd year. We are, as most of you know, very close to polio being eradicated from the face of the earth. We must keep up the hard work and get the last two countries of Pakistan and Afghanistan without a wild polio virus case. These last two countries have to be polio free for three years in order to be considered polio free.

WE WILL DO IT AND OUR DISTRICT NEEDS YOUR HELP, DEAR FELLOW ROTARIANS!!



Here is where you all come into play. I have listed a few activities that should and could take place this Rotary

year. (I have waited for 6 weeks to put this out) you know how the first few weeks of a new Rotary year can be a little hectic. Now the clubs are ready!!

You are all members of our district polio committee and you have been for a few years. I have asked you to serve, because you are all champions for polio in my mind and have demonstrated it by your going on NIDs, a number of you more than once. You have shared information with your club and other clubs in your group area. Thank you!!

Activities planned already: A Bolio event with the 3 Simi Valley RCs, a basketball game at Cal Poly, the Women's team playing UCSB, proceeds going to polio. The Street Fair in Thousand Oaks in October, in SLO also in January, a Pajama Run, to take place during our District Conference in Bakersfield, the Mammoth Run in Moorpark, Pints for Polio project, Montecito RC, this will be unveiled at our DC. A dinner at the Junkyard Restaurant in Simi Valley. Our DG Sandi, doing her bike ride to raise money..

Our World Polio Day, October 24th, will be a project where each RC in our district will vaccinate (simulate) by marking little pinkies with purple ink and in doing so, ask for a donation to polio. If there is a NID Alum in the club, we will ask them to do the vaccinating. This will not only promote polio eradication, but will alert and remind our members to the fact that Rotary's #1 goal is to End Polio Now and is to keep it front and center by each club around the world.

I would like to see a polio program carried out in each of our 72 clubs in D 5240, I will provide you with all the information you need. I will be sending out a polio report each week, I want you to contact the club presidents and ask them if you could come by and give a short report on the polio situation as of the week, if you can't make it in person, email it to the presidents and ask them to read it to their members.

If you have heard of other polio projects, please share with all of us. I will send them to Wade Nomura to place in the district newsletter.

Polio this week as of 18 August 2018

<u>Headlines</u>: In Papua New Guinea, a third case of circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 1 (cVDPV1) has been confirmed, from a newly-infected province (Enga province). Emergency outbreak response is being enhanced and reviewed, including to potentially expand vaccination geographically.

<u>Afghanistan:</u> No new cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) were reported in the past week. The total number of cases for 2018 remains ten. The most recent case had onset of paralysis on 22 June, from Kunar province.

<u>Pakistan:</u> No new cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) were reported this week. The total number of officially reported WPV1 cases in Pakistan in 2018 is three. The latest case had onset of paralysis on 18 May, from Dukki district, Balochistan province. Four new WPV1-positive environmental samples were reported in the past week, from Punjab, Karachi and Sindh, all collected in July.

Nigeria: No new cases of wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) were reported in the past week. The most recently-detected WPV1 case had onset of paralysis on 21 August 2016 from Borno state. One new circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) in community contact of an AFP case has been reported this week from Yobe state. The country continues to be affected in 2018 by two separate cVDPV2 outbreaks, the first centered in Jigawa state, and the second in Sokoto state. In response to cVDPV2 detection, the country continues to conduct additional acute flaccid paralysis surveillance strengthening activities including enhanced active surveillance visits and community sampling. The programme has also carried out an extensive search for type 2 containing vaccines (tOPV/mOPV2) in the areas surrounding where the virus was detected.
