TRF Cadre Assignment in Matamoros, Mexico

DRFCC and Rotary Foundation Cadre Wade Nomura was recently in Matamoros, Tamaulipas, Mexico to evaluate a water project for the Rotary Foundation. Wade serves as a Technical Coordinator of Water and Sanitation project evaluator for the Rotary Foundation globally. The project in Matamoros supplied 16,680 people that previously had no water for their homes. The project was a distribution pipe system that provides domestic water to households in13 difference Colonies. This project was done in conjunction with the local government and Community Water supervisor (also a Rotarian) and a Rotary club in Houston. "The impact of this project was immediately noticeable, you can literally see the difference where the project supplied households had the water and those that did not." said Wade.



Though the project only provided domestic potable water to homes, it did not provide consumable water for consumption. The results of the project was very impressive, as the households now had water for hygiene care, to wash clothes, bathe, wash down countertops in kitchens and bathrooms, had water for food production and for future consumption once a filtration system is installed.

The Rotary Club of Matamoros Profesional was the host club and had a membership of 32 women and 1 male, and was an extremely active club.

"This was one of the quickest turn around project evaluations I have ever performed. I checked into my hotel in Brownsville Texas at 2:00am Sunday night, started out for Mexico at 7:00am, spent the day visiting project sites, had dinner and a Rotary meeting, returned to my hotel at 11:30pm and left for the airport at 4:30am Tuesday morning" said Wade. " and I was able to submit my 44 page report by Friday".

Stay tuned for upcoming Cadre trip reports to Haiti and other locations.

Featured on www.polioeradication.org: interview with Jean-Marc Olivé, Chairman of the Technical Advisory Group, on what needs to be done to end polio in the Horn of Africa; Djibouti carried out a successful round of National Immunization Days (NIDs) since 2015 to avoid the risk of polio virus importation.

Afghanistan:

- No wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases were reported in the past week.
- The total number of WPV1 cases in 2018 is 21. Six WPV1-positive environmental samples were reported this week: two from Jalalabad district, Nangarhar province; three from Lashkargah district, Hilmand province, and one from Kandahar district, Kandahar province. Samples were collected 5-25 November.

Pakistan:

- No wild poliovirus type 1 (WPV1) cases have been reported in the past week.
- The total number of WPV1 cases in 2018 is 8.

Nigeria:

- One new circulating vaccine-derived poliovirus type 2 (cVDPV2) case was reported this week from Zango LGA, Katsina State, with date of onset of paralysis on 5 November. The total number of cVDPV2 cases in 2018 is now 32.
- No cases of wild polovirus type 1 (WPV1) were reported. The most recently-detected WPV1 case, from Borno state, had onset of paralysis on 21 August 2016.
