



We have speakers on the third Thursday of every month and offer special programs as appropriate. In September and October we will be offering one hour webinars on Electric Vehicles (EV101) to support those interested in what might well be one of the positive tipping points to address the climate crisis.

What is a Major Donor and Arch Klumph Society Member?

Major Donor – The Rotary Foundation recognizes individuals or couples whose combined giving reaches US\$10,000, regardless of the gift designation. This recognition level can be achieved only through personal contributions. Major Donors may elect to receive a crystal recognition piece and pin(s) commemorating the gift at each new recognition level. Since Rotary's Major Donor recognition began there have been over 30,000 Major Donors.

Arch Klumph Society – Donors whose cumulative gifts total US\$250,000 or more are recognized as Arch Klumph Society members. Recognition includes an induction ceremony and your picture and biography in the Arch Klumph Society interactive gallery at the Rotary international headquarters in Evanston, Illinois, USA. Members also receive invitations to society events, along with membership pins and crystals that commemorate their giving level. Since the society's creation in 2004, there have been over 700 Arch Klumph Society members.

Digital Literacy Project

"Teach a mother to teach the world" - Amarok Society

I first learned of this initiative during a presentation to my Rotary club by founders Dr. Tanyss and Gem Munro, who packed up their children in 2005 and moved from Vancouver, Canada to the slums of Bangladesh to improve the education of children. They quickly realized the key was to teach the mothers to teach their children. "If you teach a mother, she invests that learning back into her community. She'll use her empowerment to stand up for women's rights, children's rights, peace, and equality. She'll use her success to improve life for everyone in the slum."

The last 18 months have shown us that fast-advancing digital technologies are transforming ways in which people work, live, and learn, and are generating new skill demands and lifelong learning needs. They are also influencing ways in which education and learning are organized and managed.

I recently had the opportunity to sit down with PRIP Wilf Wilkinson to discuss a new literacy program. In Wilf's presidential year of 2007 he added literacy as an area of focus for all clubs. He is now leading the effort to support a new literacy initiative to teach anyone with a digital device and Wi-Fi to learn to read. This new method is being adopted by the Amarok Society as they continue to teach the mothers to teach the children.
