


We lost many good friends in Rotary this past year and we are forever grateful that they were a part of our Rotary family. Their service and friendship will not be forgotten.



ROTARY FRIENDSHIP EXCHANGE (RFE)

Dave Bennet - District RFE Chair

RFE is an international reciprocal exchange program for Rotarians and their Partners that allows participants to take turns hosting one another in their homes and Clubs. It supports the Rotary Goal of promoting World Peace, Goodwill, Understanding and Fellowship. What a great way to learn more about the internationality of Rotary.

After a few years hiatus the program was resurrected in 2017 - 18 when Rotarian Dave Bennet was named District 5550 RFE Chair. After a year of planning, 3 Teams were ready to go:

- Team India Team of 10 from D5550 spent 2 weeks in D3040, Central India in January 2019.
 A Team of 8 returned to D5550 in July 2019
- Team A Australia Team of 10 from D5550 spent 2 weeks in D9780 (just N of Melbourne) in March, 2019. The return Team was to return in August but asked for a 1 year postponement. They never did return.
- Team B Australia Team of 12 from D5550 spent 2 weeks in D9800 (West of Melbourne) in March 2019. A Team of 12 returned to D5550 in August 2019.

Planning began for 2020 with the following 2 Teams prepped to go, but then Covid hit the world.

 Team Brazil - Team of 7 from D5550 was to go to D4640 and D4670 (S. Brazil) in May 2020 with the return Team to be here in August 2020.



District 5550 sent 2 groups to Australia in 2019. Pictured here is one of those groups.

 Team England - Team of 10 from D5550 was to go to D1200 (SW England) in September 2020. The return Team was to have come here in late May 2020.

Due to the Pandemic both these trips were postponed to 2021 and of course are still on hold. Due to the length of postponement and the uncertainty of Covid some participants have now understandably pulled out and the status of these exchanges is unsure at this time.

Hopefully the future will allow us to re-engage with this exciting program.



UPDATE: 1000 SURVIVAL GARDENS

At the March District Talk Show the theme of which was Water & Sanitation, the Rotary Club of Winnipeg delivered a presentation on the "1000 Survival Gardens" in South Africa, and issued a challenge to D5550 clubs to donate at least one Survival Garden kit (CDN \$250) which would be matched by RC Winnipeg. This was followed with a full article in the April edition of the District Newsletter.

Presentations were requested by several District Clubs that captured the imagination of its members, many of whom donated well in excess of a single kit, resulting in nearly \$9000 being raised thus far! This is the equivalent of almost 36 kits which will be doubled to 72 through the matching challenge!

We wish to share sincerest thanks to the District Clubs and their members that have generously contributed. We look forward to hearing from more Clubs soon!

ROTARY PEACE FELLOWSHIPS

Each year, Rotary awards up to 130 fully funded fellowships for dedicated leaders from around the world to study at one of our peace centers.

Through academic training, practice, and global networking opportunities, the Rotary Peace Centers program develops the capacity of peace and development professionals or practitioners to become experienced and effective catalysts for peace. The fellowships cover tuition and fees, room and board, round-trip transportation, and all internship and field-study expenses.

Since the program began in 2002, the Rotary Peace Centers have trained more than 1,400 fellows who now work in more than 115 countries. Many serve as leaders in governments, NGOs, the military, education, law enforcement, and international organizations like the United Nations and the World Bank.

The Rotary Peace Fellowship is designed for leaders with work experience in peace and development. Our fellows are committed to community and international service and the pursuit of peace. Each year, The Rotary Foundation awards up to 50 fellowships for master's degrees and 80 for certificate studies at premier universities.

U OF M ROTARACT CONNECTS WITH AMAROK

In April's newsletter you were introduced to the Amarok Society. The society has developed a low cost way to educate mothers and children in dense urban slums in Bangladesh. Illiterate mothers are taught by Amarok trained teachers and each mother in turn teaches five neighborhood children. The University of Manitoba Rotaract group is using Zoom to teach the teachers of Amarok so they can teach the mothers of Amarok.



"We are trying to teach them in a way that they think and retain the information through easy stories, interactive questions, pronunciation, and writing homework. Of course our lessons are still a work in progress as we are working on our fourth lesson. Despite our experience, we (Olga, Mohamed, Maria, Grace, and I) are determined to continue teaching to the best of our abilities. The determination isn't one sided either, the passion I've seen from our students is something I admire. I am grateful for the support from my awesome peers who are helping me with this project and from Rotary." - Chadine Majhi





TOASTMASTERS & ROTARY

Toastmasters International and Rotary International have formed an alliance to leverage their strengths, enabling members from both organizations to enhance their skills, broaden their networks, and increase the positive impact they have in their communities. Providing members with more opportunities for personal and professional growth is at the heart of the Rotary/Toastmasters strategic alliance. We both strive to meet the evolving needs of current and prospective members. We both strive to establish fellowship and connections, and potentially strengthen your clubs and diversify membership!

Toastmasters is a worldwide nonprofit educational organization founded in 1924. We empower our members to become more confident and effective communicators and leaders. We have a membership that exceeds 358,000 in more than 16,800 clubs in 143 countries.

Toastmasters International and Rotary International are two organizations with many commonalities, including: long history, membership/club foundation, volunteer leaders, global reach and impact by helping people grow personally and professionally.

The ongoing relationship between the two organizations began at the grassroots level with local club members learning and working together. Officially announced in the beginning of 2020, Toastmasters created a set of eight structured communication and leadership development courses for Rotary available in English, with more languages available in 2021. The online leadership and communication courses are based on the Pathways learning experience and are specifically for Rotary members. The courses are not available to Toastmasters members but they take content from various paths already available in the more comprehensive Pathways program.

Toastmasters developed the following eight courses for Rotary, all with projects that are similar to those in Pathways:

- Develop a Speech
- Deliver a Speech
- The Inspirational Speech
- Interpersonal Communication and Networking
- Leadership Basics
- Leading a Team
- Collaboration
- Building Consensus

These courses are available to Rotarians and Rotaract members who access them on Rotary's Learning Center. (member login required).
