

The Interplast Committee 'thanks' all District 9810 Clubs and individuals who have contributed to Interplast so far this Rotary year. Medical conditions treated include burns and contractures; cleft lip and palate, trauma related injuries, tumours and a range of others including hypospadias and torticollis.

The District Interplast Committee are keen to support a Surgical Team with an Observer in 2019 – 2020. To date, there is almost one half of the funds raised by District Clubs and individuals. The Surgical Team with a Rotary Observer costs \$50,000. This cost can be dependent on the country the team supports.

News from the Interplast Office – Di Gillies, Interplast Rotarian Co-ordinator finished at the end of 2018. Her replacement will be advised shortly. Di has been supportive of Rotary particularly as she herself is a Rotarian.

I'm a full-time student, studying a double degree of Arts/Law at Australian Catholic University. I also coach 3 basketball teams for Bulleen and work part-time.


Why did you join Rotaract?

Nine students arrived home, fit, healthy and with lots of stories to tell, and two new students have left Australia for their opportunity as an exchange student, and to take up their role as Rotary ambassadors and Australian ambassadors in Europe.

50 Years - 100% Attendance!

JOHN ZEIGLER, Past President 1983/84, Paul Harris Fellow (1991) and Sapphire (2012) was recognised for his 50 years of continuous service on Saturday 19th January 2019.

John's family joined with many Rotarians at Darvall aged care where he now resides to celebrate this milestone.

President Jenny Dight and Past President John Williams outlined some of John's Rotary life and presented him with a Certificate and Rotary Clock for 50 years, 100% attendance as a member of the Rotary Club of Noble Park/Keysborough.

The Presentation day was one of spontaneous recollection of JOHN ZEIGLER the creator. Son John (a past member of the club) recalled many anecdotes and set in motion many stories of fun, frivolity, effort, enjoyment and successes.

Known as the "Ideas Man" John was innovative with his input and actions in the club.

He served as Club Rotaract Chair 1977/78 and a time as District Rotaract representative for 9820 (2 Years) and 9810 (one year).

John had a catchcry "I'm dying to join Rotaract" using FRED the skeleton to emphasise this, and revived many clubs into membership increase. He is still remembered and revered to this day for his influence at that time.

He had a pet cockatoo and taught it to sit on FRED's shoulder in the passenger seat when out driving much to the surprise of many motorists who were left sitting at the traffic lights wondering what they had just seen.

John's involvement in Rotary was across all avenues of service and he hosted many youth exchange students, was Club youth exchange counsellor from 1986 to 1994 to incoming students from Japan, and visited the Rotary Club of Kofu, Japan on several occasions.

He kept Club history accurately, attended all District conferences and was absolutely, totally involved in all affairs that Rotary promoted at all levels (Local National and International), particularly focusing on Youth development.

His business was a Service Garage and he had a passion for cars, was a member of the Banzai Rodders Club and the Dandenong Valley Historic Car Club.

His 1975 HJ Holden Utility (Black Magic) won many National awards in the 1970s and 1980s and is featured on the front Cover and month of April in the Street Machine Calendar for 2019.

A notation by his son:

"This car is an expression of the creativity and passion that makes my dad tick - but is also a vital piece of our Australian motoring heritage."

I think that this statement also covers John Ziegler the Rotarian.




"The Rotary Polio Survivors Rotary Action Group has the following programs and objectives:

- Create greater awareness of Post-polio syndrome and the challenges it creates in collaboration with your district and clubs.
- To accurately record the number of Rotarians who are polio survivors.
- To form associations with individuals, organizations and institutions already engaged in assisting polio survivors.
- To engage Rotarians in a world-wide project to collect the personal stories of polio.

We serve as a resource to clubs and districts for projects aimed at improving the lives of polio survivors throughout the world. As a resource we will collaborate with Rotary clubs in your district to help promote, find partners and recognize their projects and Rotary grants that provide assistance to polio survivors. We will End Polio together but we must not forget those left in the wake of polio epidemics around the globe.
