

Through service projects, peace fellowships, and scholarships, our members are addressing underlying causes of conflict, including poverty, inequality, ethnic tension, poor access to education, and unequal distribution of resources.

During February, which is **Rotary's Peacebuilding and Conflict Prevention Month**, you can build peace and mitigate conflict:

1. Incorporate conflict resolution and mediation into service projects that involve local schools, orphanages, workplaces, and community centers.

2. Support groups that are at risk of violence or persecution by providing relief to those who have fled areas of conflict.

3. Participate in fellowship and service activities with Rotary clubs in other parts of the world to promote greater international understanding.

Recruit candidates for a <u>Rotary Peace Fellowship</u>. Up to 100 peace fellowships are offered each year at Rotary Peace Centers at universities around the world.

Bring your project ideas to life with guidance from a Rotary Action Group:



The Four-Way Test is a mirror, not a window



In our contentious society, I see friends who are members of Rotary use <u>The Four-Way Test</u> to support opposing political and social arguments and to criticize the thoughts, statements, and actions of others.

I see members with completely opposing viewpoints use the same Four-Way Test to both support their argument and demean others. Rotarians and others are using all forms of social media to share their opinions about perceived violations of The Four-Way Test, causing others to pile on additional comments and insults, all with little thought to how this affects our public image. Which leads me to this basic premise:

The Four-Way Test is a mirror, not a window

Rotary members should not use The Four-Way Test to look at others but rather to look at themselves in considering the ramifications of a thought, statement, or action. It should not be a *window* through which we look to judge others. It is a *mirror* at which we look to judge ourselves.

The argument I've heard Rotarians make is that if they determine some thought, statement, or action violates any part of the test, it is their duty to declare that thought, statement, or action wrong. I have heard The Four-Way Test used to support any number of topics, some which readers would find hard to support. Yet through the Internet, one can cobble together any sort of argument to back any thought or concept with a plethora of "facts."

I do not believe that is what The Four-Way Test is about. I believe the test is more about how we treat each other than how we measure ideas.

Of course, it is a challenging standard. It's difficult to keep from *thinking* something. But what is more important is how you act on that thought. If you *think* to yourself, "I don't like this person," it becomes a matter of what you *do* with that thought. You can try to dispel it as well as any urge to take some negative action to satisfy your dislike of the person. You can also decide whether you *say* something to that person or tell others what you think.

This is where social media distorts things, because society now seems to embrace negative, vitriolic, or fake comments – as long as the comments agree with our own views. Posting such comments even in the name of The Four-Way Test is certainly not **FAIR** to all concerned and definitely does not build **GOODWILL** and **BETTER FRIENDSHIPS**.

This brings me to the realization that using The Four-Way Test to argue political and social issues is in itself contrary to the test. We must never use the test to support a position while opposing or berating someone else's position. We should not use The Four-Way Test to support or oppose contentious "hot button" issues, to comment on political discord, or to respond to another's comment.



We need to **teach** The Four-Way Test to all of our friends. We don't need to **preach** it. Rotary takes pride that it is a non-political, non-religious organization. That has allowed us to make inroads in parts of the world where governments and religious organizations can't. Let's not sully Rotary's reputation by using these 24 words of ethical and moral thought to tear each other down.

PROBUS on the move ...

The Rotary Club of Malvern had 80 interested people attend the German Club Tivoli recently, resulting in the Foundation of the **Armadale Probus Club**. Peter Milburn reported that 38 people signed up on the spot and paid their Membership and Joining Fees at that time; from this group of committed individuals, appointments were made to the positions of President, Vice President, Secretary, Welfare Officer, Tours Officer and Speakers' Chairman, so it would appear that the Club is off to a great start!

Probus South Pacific in Sydney have arranged for the next 2 monthly meetings to be held at the German Club on the first Friday of the month; beyond that, it is up to the club members to determine if that time, day and location suits them, or if they would prefer to meet at a different location and/or at a different time or day of the week.



Bearbrass Probus had 30 attendees at Dock Library, Docklands for the successful launch of the newest Probus for active retirees. Rotary Central Melbourne President Warwick opened the meeting, which was chaired by Probus former national director and treasurer Robert Renshaw of Glen Waverley RC and District 9810. By meeting's end Bearbrass had signed on 15 members with about five more in absentia, and a near complete tally of office bearers was enrolled. Peter Duras and Roger Thornton joined with Anne King (banker-extraordinaire) to help Tony Thomas run the launch.

Robert will now apply to Probus HQ for the club's ratification. Its first regular meeting will be at 10am at the Dock on Tuesday March 10, thereafter second Tuesdays of the month. Typically, Probus clubs grow rapidly by word of mouth after formation.

Melbourne Sunrise Probus president Jill Tabart and several Sunrise members came as a goodwill delegation. Bearbrass is the first Probus Club started by District 9800 since 2016 and the first new city-based Probus since RCM launched Sunrise Probus in 2011. In District 9800, there's now 90 Probus clubs with 7100 members, compared with 65 Rotary clubs and 2200 members.

The inaugural Bearbrass President is Dr Winsome Roberts, originally a social anthropologist and now a with distinguished research history at Melbourne University in social and community analysis. <u>https://www.facebook.com/tthomas061/</u>






