Following the tsunami that devastated Tonga in January 2022, the Rotary Club of Sunnybank Hills. Qld, teamed up with RAWCS to bring hope, healing and a renewed sense of community to the island nation.

IN JANUARY 2022, the

monstrous Isunami, with waves towering over 19 metres above sea level. The aftermath left the island of Tonga in disarray, with Nukunuku Primary School severely affected. However, hope was on the horizon as the Rotary Club of Surnybank Hills, Qid, embarked on a life-changing mission to repair and restore the school. Situated in the heart of Nukunuku Village,

(RAWCS) Northern Region
to offer much-needed
support to the school and its

The primary goal was
to repair and repaint the
external walls of the school
restoring a Sense of normalcy
for the students, who had
endured unimaginable
challenges in the aftermath
of the disaster, and enhance
the educational environment.
The Rotary Club of
Sunnybank packed a
container filled with modern
school desks, chairs, an
abundance of reading hooks;

and textbooks suitable for both primary and secondary classes. Beyond the classroom, the project extended to addressing structural issues within the school. The team



painting equipment and building materials to repair damaged classroom floors and replace three external doors, ensuring the safety and functionality of

and functionality of the school. Recognising that the healing process extend beyond the classroom walls, the Rotary Club of Sunnybank Hills also lent a helping hand to the Nukunuku Medical Clief by donating a roa the Nukunuku Medical Clinic by donating a range of medical equipment, including wheelchairs, blood pressure monitors, digital thermometers, hospital pressure incommenters, hospital beds, a gynaecological examination electric bed, and a medical hoist to assist in patient care. These

supplies will significantly improve healthcare access for the local community, underscoring the depth of the club's commitment to the people of Tonga.

A crucial aspect of the success of this mission was the collaboration between the Rotary Club of Sunnybank Hills and the Rotary Club of Sunnybank Hills and the Rotary Club of Muku Jalofa. The Zone 8 Regional Council's mission is to increase Rotary and Rotaract's reach and impact by better supporting clubs, so they grow year after year. To do this, we must act immediately.

FROM July 2018 to June 2023, an average of 5,000 Rotary an average of 5,000 kotally members resigned every year in Zone 8. That's over 25,000 Rotarians lost! Yet, over the same time we only attracted around 18,000 new members. In the same five nated 155

Rotary clubs yet formed only

Rotary clubs yet formed only 48 new ones. Can you imagine the huge loss of income, skills and volunteers to our clubs and districts? Our declining membership is proof: we're trying to sell an outdated 'product'

people no longer want to buy. That is, many people no longer find the membership experiences we're offering through our clubs appealing. Our clubs are like showrooms, where people take our membership experience for a test drive.



Like any product, we must adapt over time to meet people's changing needs, while also retaining our core values. My membership team on the Regional Council will pursue two key growth

will pursue two key growth strategies:

1. Starting new clubs to attract new demographics. Every new club brings in at least 20 new members. And most of these people are joining Rotary or Rotaract for the first time.

2. Reducing member

2. Reducing member resignations and attracting new members by creating irresistible new club experiences. If we reduced resignations by 20 per cent per year, we'd gain 1,000 members each year!

Over 1,300 gifts for children ranging from 0-18yrs and \$2,600 in gift cards were collected over November and early December from participating businesses and local donors.

The dream of the project was to make Christmas brighter for Children and families doing it tough in our local area.

Gift cards and presents were distributed through Anchor and the Lilydale Proactive Policing unit, with some donations also going to Dandenong Ranges Emergency relief service, Anglicare family services and Boorndawan William Aboriginal Healing Centre.

Anchor was able to give every child accessing their services a gift – with the message that the gifts had come from people in their local community.

The Lilydale Proactive Policing unit visited community housing, local caravan parks, individual families. Officers found the experience of bringing joy (with gifts) on their visits very positive and moving.
