Scooter Chief and Fellowship Cup holder Cec McPaul gave an account of the Scooter Project, which is in great shape—we currently have 53 Scooter Recipients and 7 spares for use in case of breakdowns. Cec gave us an

anecdote of a recent gentleman recipient who broke down in tears—hi is disabled and had no independent freedom of movement—his wife and children had left him behind and he could not go out on his own. Our scooter has given him a new lease on life— great to hear how our efforts are changing lives.

Guest Speaker Detective Sergeant Renee Garske

The consensus of the feeling in the Rotary room during Det. Sgt. Renee Garske's talk was one of sadness--

As segment Chairman, Bruce introduced Renee --a Brisbane girl who attended Griffith University and attained a Bachelor of Criminology.

She worked on the Gold Coast in Juvenile Aide--Child abuse. She became a Det. Sgt. in 2009. She noted that she enjoys this kind of investigative work.

This is not her first contact with Rotary, since she has been a nominee previously for Rotary Fellowships.

The internet medium is the cause of a lot of issues in Child Abuse. "The dark side of the web--Child exploitation".

The main part of Renee's address centred round policing child assaults in Papua New Guinea working in the Child Protection Unit.

She has worked in P. N.G. on two occasions in partnership & on assignment with members the AFP, dealing with sexual assaults. So assisting with investigative Policing and helping to build law enforcement capabilities.

These are important facets of the policing task. Specialised

training for P.N.G. Police has to come from outside countries., Sexual offences have become more prevalent since independence was granted in 1975. These are tribal influenced. Girls need educating and learn that these practices are very wrong. Society has to change and not tolerate this behaviour.

Females are accustomed to violence--There is no respect for females--Men have multiple wife's and partners. Miss treated women and children become a real issue.

Reported incidents of sexual abuse in P.N.G. are horrific. Changing the tribal approach to this is "Every bodies business".

The P.N.G. stats. are shocking--50% of rape victims are under the age of 15 years. Some are younger than 10 years. The sex industry is very active in P.N. G.

The tribal influence on young men is the major cause of this situation. There are warped customs and beliefs. The homicide rate is well above the rate of civilised nations. Young men belonging to "Rascal" gangs are to blame. They are terrible.

Changing the tribal ways of abuse is a huge undertaking. Most offences are committed by a friend of the sufferer. Corruption is rife. Police offices have been guilty of sexual miss deeds. Lots of offences happen in the home.

Unfortunately prosecution rates for sexual offences are very low.

Families often pay for the Police to attend and investigate offences.

67% of wives have been beaten by their husbands. 55% have experienced forced sex by a known person. 14% of men have committed rapes. Gang rapes are frequent, but often go Un-recorded.

Port Moresby is the most dangerous city in the world. An 8yr old girl was raped in the street, it was witnessed--no one went to her aide. Up to 20 rapes are reported daily to the Police.

Offenders can be forced to pay compensation. Unfortunately these funds are taken by the senior male tribe members and usually the females do not receive any of the compensation.

A husband severed an ear of his wife's. He paid 500 kina to his wife's` family--the senior men of the tribe kept the funds. There are tortures in the villages.

There is no trust more sacred than the one the world holds for children.

There is no duty more important than ensuring that their rights are protected.

Sgt. Garske's well presented talk left us in no doubt about the seriousness of the P.N.G. tribal behaviour in relation the sex crimes.

One Year Without Polio in Nigeria

Today marks one year since Nigeria last reported a polio case caused by the wild poliovirus.

This is the longest the country has ever gone without a case of polio, and it's a critical step on the path toward a polio-free Africa. It was only a decade ago that polio struck 12,631 people in Africa in one year — three-quarters of all cases in the world.

August 11 will mark an even greater milestone: one year since the last case of polio in Africa. For Africa to be certified polio-free by the World Health Organization, it must go two more years without a case of polio. To do this, all children in Nigeria must continue to receive the polio vaccine, including those in hard-to-reach areas.
