Guest Speaker

Reverend Canon Len Nairn

"History of the All Saints Anglican School"



As President Bill has previously mentioned Len Nairn used to be a Rotarian, this was in 1960, he found that being a Parish Priest and a Rotarian proved too much, and he unfortunately had to leave Rotary to follow his vocation. This ultimately led him to following a dream, or a vision, of founding a coeducational school within the Anglican Faith. He left a secure position in Canberra to apply for a new challenge to found such a school in Queensland's Gold Coast. A number of powerful and visionary individuals on the Gold Coast had formed the same idea as Len and this led to him being appointed as Headmaster of a school that was non existent at the time in 1986. With no funding promised by the Diocese and none available from Federal Government until the project was viable (this took a further 2 years) Len (from a very small office in Mudgerabah), and his supporters set about acquiring a site and sufficient funds from generous donors to build the

school and have it ready to open on Australia Day 1987. The original Foundation Stone had been laid on 2nd November 1986, and the project was completed, with much assistance from the now famous Russ Hinze.

The project was built in Mudgerabah, with little enthusiastic support from the other private school Summerville, their Headmaster coolly confronting Len with "There is no room for another private school in Mudgerabah." There are now some 28 private schools on the Gold Coast.

Headmaster Len personally interviewed every child, before accepting them into the school, a policy he continued for more than 10 years. He confirms that within this Anglican School the Gospel is lived and taught, and that quality of life is equally important as the quality of performance.

Headmaster Len believes that the success of the school is due to the outstanding quality of the team of people employed in the school. Currently there are 1,850 students with a further 2,000 on the waiting list. Priority of choice of new students is given to the children of school staff and children of previous students.
