Janette Etherington: Interplast - repairing bodies and rebuilding lives

Interplast sends teams of volunteer plastic and reconstructive surgeons, anaesthetists, nurses and allied health professionals to provide life-changing surgery and medical training in seventeen developing nations in the Asia-Pacific region. Work is undertaken in partnership with local organisations, including hospitals and universities.

Rotary co-founded Interplast in 1983. Rotary Clubs and Rotarians across Australia and New Zealand remain invaluable partners in Interplast's mission to "repair bodies and rebuild lives".

Janette Etherington is the Interplast Rotarian Engagement Coordinator. She describes her role as her "dream job". She has an absolute passion for the work that Interplast does, and the difference it makes to so many people's lives.

Janette has been a Rotarian for nearly 10 years. She is a member and Past President of the Rotary Club of Nunawading, in District 9810. In Janette's previous work lives she has held a number of senior management positions in retail, bookselling and the apprenticeship sector, working in both the commercial and not-for-profit worlds.

GUEST SPEAKER: KEVIN LOVE - WESTERNPORT VALUES AND CHALLENGES

(Note that the presentation was Kevin's personal views and not the position of any organisation that he is involved with)

Bio:

- Kevin is a long-term member and has been involved with natural resource management since the late 1980s and ia an acknowledged national leader in natural resource management and coastal policy. He currently operates a consultancy specialising in project management, policy advice and governance. He is the current Chair of the Phillip Island Nature Parks Board
- For over 20 years Kevin worked in the Victorian Departments of Agriculture and Premier and Cabinet, including in regional Victoria, as a Deputy Secretary and as an advisor to Premiers Kennett and Bracks on natural resources and infrastructure matters

Summary of presentation:

- Kevin provided a powerpoint presentation which is available on request
- Kevin acknowledged the Bunurong people of the Western Port area, noting that the Bunorong were custodians of the area when it was a river valley and long before the sea rose and created the bay it is today. He said: 'War – mar -in, the area we know as Western Port, is the traditional lands of the Bunurong people. They are the custodians of the cultural heritage of the lands and waters and I acknowledge their ongoing connection'
- Western Port has an internationally significant wetland, is next to a nationally significant port and a growing part of Melbourne.

History

- 80,000 to 20,000 years ago sea levels were 100m lower than today and the bay was dry land. It began to fill about 10,000 years ago and reached its current level about 6,000 years ago
- The Yallock-Bulluck and other clans of the Bunurong occupied these lands. Significant dispossession had occurred by 1839.
- George Bass visited in 1798 and attempts at British settlement were made in the 1820's, long before Melbourne was settled
- Western Port is so named because it was the westernmost port Bass had mapped on his journey from Sydney
- Draining of the Koo Wee Rup swamp in the late 1800's and early 1900's led to large inflows of sediment and loss of seagrass. This has caused major environmental disruption

- A prison was established on French Island in 1916 and industrial development of Crib Point and Hastings / Long Island Point occurred in the 1960's and 70's. Premier Bolte called the area the 'Ruhr of the south'. Key developments include: John Lysaght and Bluescope Steel at Hastings; an Esso gas plant; it as also earmarked for a large wind farm which was recently rejected by the Commonwealth Minister, under its powers under the Ramsar Convention
- The Ramsar Convention (named after the city in Iran where it was signed) was enacted in 1982 to protect the habitat for birds, especially migratory birds
- Other agreements are in force including the East Asian Australian Flyway which protects birds which make an annual migratory trip between Western Port and Siberia
- By the late 1970's the importance of understanding and better managing the environment was recognised. Bird counting has been done continuously since 1973 and the area was designated an internationally significant wetland in the early 1980's.

How Western Port bay works

- There are two entrances to the bay to the west and east of Phillip Island. The western
 entrance is much wider so the tidal movement is predominately in a clockwise direction
 around French Island. There is a 2m tidal range so a lot of water comes into and out of
 the bay each day
- The turnover of water is the major reason why the water is so clean, despite the poor
 quality of some of the estuaries feeding into the bay. It also leads to a lot of
 resuspension of sediment that has come into the bay. The sediment, which commenced
 with the draining of the Koo-Wee Rup swamp, settles around the eastern end and
 remains the key challenge in overall management of bay
- The bay sits in a catchment of 370,000 ha. It has a total area of 68,000 ha, including 27,000 ha of sand and mudflats, half of which supports seagrass meadows
- The mudflats, sea grass, mangrove and salt marsh habitats support a range of species but are particularly important for birds and fish, and fish breeding

Pressures

- Climate change puts pressure on the system mainly through sea level rise, storm surges and change in fish stock
- Sediments smother seagrass and produces additional turbidity; the sediment amount is now stabilising with tree planting in the hills, erosion work, new mangrove plantings
- Toxicants can impact on sea life eg insecticides from urban and rural sources; and PFAS
- Diffuse sources are the key problem in the absence of major infrastructure development
- There have been number of infrastructure projects proposed with various levels of impact – ranging in scale up to 20 times previous developments
- Seagrass loss in 60s and 70s is slowly being arrested with new growth
- Counting birds annually since 1973- the red necked stint and eastern curlew are the key migratory species- numbers are down slated because of industrial devt in China; the indigenous dominant bird is the black swan
- Summary of pressures: climate change impacts, agricultural run off (for example from large increase in aspapagus production), rural and urban pollution (for ex termite treatment chemical run off), sediment (from agricultural sources is the dominant cause, the erosion run off), sea level rise impacts seagrass areas, industrial and urban development and growth keeps progressively coming and needs effective management.

Managing the bay sustainably

 Melbourne Water have stepped up to improve our understanding of the bay and its processes – building on the benchmark Shapiro study of 1975; counting birds since

- 1973; Melb. Water scientific reports in 2018, 2019, 2023
- The Ramsar Management Plan identifies the key elements required: water quality improvement (sediment & toxicants), climate change adaptation (erosion, rising sea level), protecting flora and fauna
- While there are several entities with management responsibility, the key players are Melbourne Water, the EPA and the planning system.

Questions and reflection

- There was time for two questions which focused on the effectiveness of the current state
 of management of the Bay which Kevin responded on successes in stabilising sediment
 run-off and increased seagrass growth and emphasised the ongoing challenges he
 covered in his words.
- Western Port is often taken for granted by Melbournians however its importance as an internationally significant wetland and its sensitivity was highlighted by Kevin's presentation. Hopefully this will lead to greater respect and interest from members.

- In her induction presentation, Fleur recounted a Rotary humanitarian trip to Myanmar which experienced a mortar attack by the Myanmar military to destroy the farms of Karen minority villagers in what is the longest running civil war in the world. Fleur reflected that these are the sorts of challenges for Rotary to manage in the modern world and that she, like others, have the vocational skills needed to make a difference.



District Membership

The efforts of clubs in the first half of our year saw that as of 30 November we had 64 clubs, including 2 Rotaract, with 1885 members.

This resulted in an increase of 13 members across the District for that five month period. A positive achievement!

A common trend of decline across all Zone 8 clubs has continued however. On entering the new year our District Treasurer has paid levies based on My Rotary membership figures entered by our clubs that see us with 1840 members, a drop of 32 since the beginning of our Rotary year (1872) and 45 from November 30.

Membership is an ongoing challenge but I'm sure you'll join me in taking up this challenge. Let's all aim from this point to increase our current club membership by 1 at

June 30. In this way we will at least do our bit to halt the decline with this modest target.


