
NEXT MEETING

GUEST SPEAKER - SERGEANT STEVE TURNER



Sergeant Steve Turner, Leading Senior Constable Julie Woods and Sergeant Ben McWilliam - the Silk Miller Scholarship

Sergeant Turner is the 2024 Silk Miller Scholarship awardee. He will speak on his innovative current role and how he anticipates the course will assist him. Commander Jo Stafford of Victoria Police will present his award.

Steve has spent the last 14 years working in the western suburbs of Melbourne, observing the revolving door of young people in and out of police custody. It has led him to look at what police do, and what can be done differently for better outcomes.

For the last 7 years he has been developing YCEIP (Youth Crime Early Intervention Project) Co-Led with WestJustice and other stakeholders. This project moved to implementation in 2022 and has achieved some very promising results. He oversees all young people in custody – looking for the drivers to crime, and what can be done to stop the young person coming back into police contact. This includes reviewing the young person's police history, the incident they were arrested for, support service referral and liaising with other services.

Steve completed the Cert IV in Adolescent Health & Wellbeing in 2021 which had a direct influence on his work. He now feels very privileged to have received the Silk Miller Award which is now allowing him to complete year 2 of the graduate diploma.

Also speaking are our two most recent graduates - Leading Senior Constable Julie Woods and Sergeant Ben McWilliam - who will receive their graduation certificates from Dr Ani Wierenga from University of Melbourne. We will hear from Julie and Ben, who will outline the impact their studies have had, and are having, on their very difficult work.

Rotary Central Melbourne instigated the Silk Miller Scholarship in 2000. It is named in memory of two slain Victoria Police Officers, Sergeant Gary Silk and Senior Constable Rodney Miller. Scholarships funded by the Club have now been awarded to 23 police officers. Our Club became involved when Rotary's focus on health included the issues of youth suicide prevention and youth mental illness. The Club pays 50% of the individual's course fee and the recipient funds the other 50% personally. This may help explain the commitment and passion these officers have for their roles in improving outcomes for adolescents.

FROM THE LAST MEETING

Rotary Central Melbourne online meeting - 12 March 2024

In spite of artificial un-intelligent gremlins creating havoc with our zoom link, some 16-20 intrepid Rotarians managed to overcome the connection problems and enjoy a most interesting and informative online meeting. We connected with our guest speaker and toasted Rotary International, prior to Malcolm giving a lovely introduction to Nikki Firmin from DV Safe Phone.

Nikki Firmin: Safe phones, save lives!

Nikki explained how in April 2020, the CEO and Founder of DV Safe Phone, Ashton Wood, realised that mobile phones, often a lifeline for victims, become casualties in cases of domestic violence, leaving survivors isolated and vulnerable during emergencies (these phones often get deliberately broken, lost or stolen). Driven by this understanding, DV Safe Phone (www.dvsafephone.org) was founded with a mission to repurpose unused mobile phones (from people's drawers, garages, etc) and place them into the hands of domestic violence survivors.

As an example, during Covid-19 lockdowns, many Domestic Violence (DV) victims could not escape, and so a safe, unobtrusive, basic-emergency phone was potentially a lifesaver.

DV Safe Phone distribute a safe phone kit which includes a working mobile phone (carefully re-cleaned, wiped clean digitally (assurance to donors on this matter)). They have already given out 7500 kits. Note that they provide them to front line agencies and services trained to offer specialised domestic and family violence support. They have launched a H.A.L.T. map on the website, whereby you can search for an authorised agency via this nationwide H.A.L.T Map.

Unused phones can be donated using the donate phone button on their website or there are lots of drop off locations mentioned on their website. Nikki noted that Rotary and Safe Phones have similar core values and they have already partnered with Rotary in some locations.

During questions, we were advised that phones of 4G and above are accepted, but noting it is a phone to use as a call for help, the very latest phones are not wanted since they may be stolen for resale. Our club is looking at ways to collect old phones simply and easily.

In final reports and closing of the meeting, President Michelle thanked us all for persisting in connecting to the meeting this morning. She reminded us of the IFTAR dinner on Friday the 5th of April and that the Strategy Day notes will be posted to members shortly. The club's meeting structure has been reviewed and confirmed for the near future.

Michelle's closing reflection was from John Harrigan: "Happiness held is the seed, happiness shared is the flower".



What is a Rotary Peace Fellowship?

A two-year Master's Degree:

Students from diverse backgrounds and professional experience undertake programs varying in length from 15 to 24 months and include two to three months of applied field experience designed by the peace fellow. The fully funded post graduate study is at an internationally recognised Peace Centre in England, Japan, Sweden, or USA.

Professional Development Certificate:

Designed for mid-career professionals in fields of peace and conflict resolution to study in Uganda or Turkey. Applicants must have connection with Africa or the Middle East. The Certifcate program includes:

- Preliminary online course
- 10-week on-site course
- Field studies
- A social change initiative
- One-week on-site capstone seminar

- Tuition and fees
- Room and board
- Round-trip transportation
- Field study expenses
- Health insurance
