GUEST SPEAKER - 20 FEBRUARY 2024



Gordon Conochie: The world's longest serving prime minister & Cambodia's pursuit of democracy

Gordon will reveal how Cambodia's prime minister, the world's longest serving prime minister, nearly lost power, regained control and has held on for longer than any other. He'll also discuss democracy in Asia and the battle between the West and China.

Gordon Conochie is an adjunct research fellow at La Trobe University and the author of *A Tiger Rules the Mountain - Cambodia's Pursuit of Democracy*, which was a pick of the week in The Australian and Canberra Times. It has been praised by Gareth Evans (former Australian Foreign Minister) as "intriguing and enriching". Gordon was born in Scotland, where he worked as a journalist and has master's degrees in politics and international relations. He lived in Cambodia for nearly three years where he predominantly worked on education strategy and policy, working closely with the Ministry of Education, UNICEF and the World Bank and Cambodian charities. After leaving to work in the health sector in Australia, Gordon continued to return to Cambodia to interview people for *A Tiger Rules the Mountain*. Gordon also now works in Aboriginal health policy.

FROM THE LAST MEETING

Meeting opened by President Michelle who introduced Guest Speaker, Janette Etherington.

Chair, Puja Ganguli overcame the Zoom link, which we have all wrestled with from time to time, to take over from Michelle during Janette's presentation.

Presentation: Interplast – repairing bodies and renewing lives. Janette Etherington, Interplast Engagement Coordinator.

- Interplast was founded in 1983. The objective was and is to change lives for the better in Pacific and Asian countries where some services just don't exist. This is achieved through surgical procedures and practical training of locals. Thus both patients and trainees benefit. Funding comes from Australian Government, Rotary Districts, corporate and private donors. Medical specialists provide services on a voluntary basis.
- Janette's presentation included many actual examples.
 - Gladi, in Laos who had a 3kg benign tumour removed,
 - Rockson, Pacific Islander who had very severe cleft lip and palate repaired using a bone graft of one of Rockson's ribs,
 - James from PNG with very severe burns. In this case, COVID intervened in 2020 but was defeated by Interplast use of remote training and webinars.
 - Dil in Nepal received surgery for badly broken leg. Not only was the leg saved, but probably Dil's life.
- These are typical examples of the many thousands of lives saved or repaired.
- Post-COVID allowed a return to "normal" starting with trip number 145 to Fiji in 2022. Targets resumed their previous lifts, now looking to services in 20 countries and 80 hospitals
- A truly wonderful Rotary project. No wonder Janette described her position as her "dream job".

Chair, Puja introduced Subramanian, a visitor from Chennai, India. Subramanian explained that he is visiting Melbourne to see his daughter. He may attend our "in the flesh" meeting at RACV next week.

District Membership

The efforts of clubs in the first half of our year saw that as of 30 November we had 64 clubs, including 2 Rotaract, with 1885 members.

This resulted in an increase of 13 members across the District for that five month period. A positive achievement!

A common trend of decline across all Zone 8 clubs has continued however. On entering the new year our District Treasurer has paid levies based on My Rotary membership figures entered by our clubs that see us with 1840 members, a drop of 32 since the beginning of our Rotary year (1872) and 45 from November 30.

Membership is an ongoing challenge but I'm sure you'll join me in taking up this challenge. Let's all aim from this point to increase our current club membership by 1 at

June 30. In this way we will at least do our bit to halt the decline with this modest target.



- A bachelor's degree and five years of relevant work experience [Professional Certificate]
- A bachelor's degree, plus three years of relevant work experience [Master's Degree]

Why become a Rotary Peace Fellow?

Rotary Peace Fellows become leaders and catalysts for peace and conflict resolution. Typically, they work in national governments, NGOs, the military, media, law enforcement, peace education, international organisations such as Red Cross, the UN and World Bank, and grass roots community organisations. This is a signature program for Rotary International.

How to apply?

- All Rotary Peace Fellows are selected through a competitive worldwide process.
- Speak to a Rotarian you know.
- or contact a Rotary club.
- Review the process online via the QR code or programs/peace-fellowships

What is a Rotary Peace Fellowship?

A two-year Master's Degree:

Students from diverse backgrounds and professional experience undertake programs varying in length from 15 to 24 months and include two to three months of applied field experience designed by the peace fellow. The fully funded post graduate study is at an internationally recognised Peace Centre in England, Japan, Sweden, or USA.

Professional Development Certificate:

Designed for mid-career professionals in fields of peace and conflict resolution to study in Uganda or Turkey. Applicants must have connection with Africa or the Middle East. The Certifcate program

- A social change initiative
- One-week on-site capstone seminar
