Guest Speaker

Fabiola Campbell was introduced by Suvam as a woman with a unique pathway into Australian life. She spoke about that journey. Interesting indeed; starting as a "reverse migrant", having been born in Australia and then leaving (with of course an Australian Passport) with her Venezuelan parents at the age of six months!

Fabiola's father, a nephrologist who had come to Australia as a doctor very keen to learn about kidney transplant procedures developed here. He was an enthusiastic "Ozophile" and Fabiola grew up hearing about the best aspects of Australian life. Safe. Beautiful. So was it any wonder that after studying to be a criminologist, Fabiola set out for a life in paradise.

Problems arose at the airport where presenting an Australian passport but having no English language raised a concern at the immigration counter. Her stated profession as a "criminologist" did not help the situation. But in due course after the required dose of tear shedding, she was deemed a pass. One wonders if that would be the case today...

This experience drew Fabiola to the conclusion that notwithstanding her passport, she was effectively an immigrant. Having poor English language meant she was unable to do a lot – from participating in small talk (a necessary part of assimilation) to applying for a job, preparing a CV, and attending interviews. She came to realise that many people in Australia were not born here and many don't speak English very well.

In Venezuela, newcomers are accepted through conversations – eg. about one's home town or university. It's the same in Australia of course but not if your home is far away, your university has never been heard of and the whole process is hampered by language. "You can't even tell a joke." And of course, no one wants to lose their home country's identity but also of course newcomers always want to fit in.

Fabiola has now been here 18 years. She is older and wiser but knows too that she doesn't have to shed her Venezuela-ness. It is a matter of compromise. Speaking with an accent is fine.

Living this experience led to a decision to start Professional Migrant Women, PMW. PMW work at the three main barriers to their clients:

- · Lack of personal connection. Loneliness.
- Lack of professional networks which "back home" would come through such as family, friends, school/university friends, and jobs.
- Lack of knowledge of the Australian job market. Obviously knowledge of the job market is contextual and without growing up here, specific training needs to be undertaken.
- The result can be that you become invisible, empty.

You are a professional and qualified. You should be able to get a job. Reality dictates that most often if migrants arrive as a couple it is the man who first gets a job and it is the woman who gets caught in "home duties" often to do with raising kids. And by the time that duty has lessened enough to consider a return to work, qualifications and experience have lost some of their value due to passing time.

So, PMW help women through this problem – help them find employment, and teach them skills, such as leadership and presentation.

In winding up, Fabiola remarked that her visit to Central Melbourne Rotary today had made her realise that Rotary is an excellent vehicle for helping migrants this way. It has connection and an ethic of "giving back". The thought doubtless going through many members' minds was that Fabiola should stay in touch and maybe here is another (yes, another) opportunity for mentorship. As one member said, "We're up for it!"


