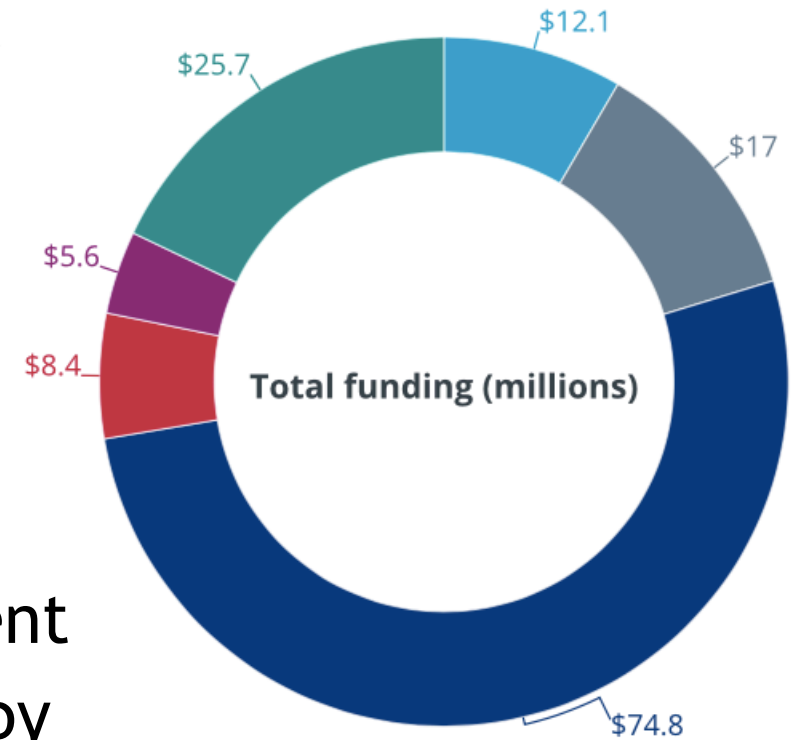

- Matching dollars received from the Bill and Melinda Gates Foundation



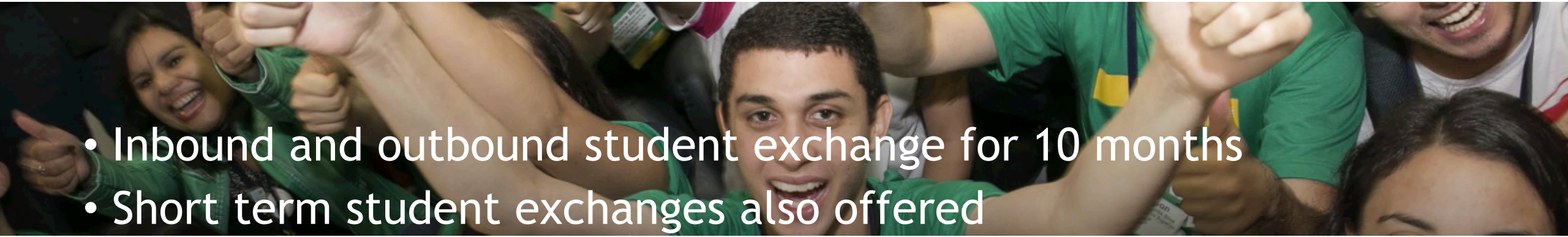
School Breakfast Program

- In partnership with the Sinclair Group, we are proud to help provide this program to feed kids a hot breakfast in in several of the local elementary and secondary schools. A child who has a full stomach before classes begin can focus, learn and retain much better than ones that don't. It is estimated that one million children across Canada don't eat breakfast due to their family's economic situation. Once per week, we serve hot breakfasts to kids at Westwood Elementary.



- In the 2023-2025 school years alone we donated \$5,000 to Westwood, \$4,000 to Spruceland, \$7,000 to Pineview and \$5,000 to Duchess Park PACs towards their breakfast programs
- Since inception, we have donated well over \$100,000 to this program.

Worldwide Student Exchange Program



- Inbound and outbound student exchange for 10 months
- Short term student exchanges also offered
- Paid by Community Gaming Grant funds
- Volunteer host families receive \$300/month
- Student receives \$150 / month, plus bus passes, etc.
- Financial support, volunteer hosting, and chaperones while on overnight stays while touring BC are also provided
- Host families immerse the student with their local culture

Rotary Youth Leadership Awards

- Our Club financially supports the these two RYLA programs, paid for by our Community Gaming Grant funds to develop leadership:

Scholarships and Bursaries

- Our Club offers these to local grade 12 students progressing to CNC or UNBC from DP Todd, College Heights, PGSS, Duchess Park and Shas-Ti Kelly Road Secondary Schools

- Each year, we provide a total of \$15,500 as follows:
 - 2 SD57 Academic Bursaries of \$2,000 each
 - 2 SD57 Trade Bursaries of \$2,000 each
 - 4 Karl Anderson Bursaries of \$1,000 each
 - 1 SD57 Wally West Bursary for \$1,000
 - 2 CNC Scholarships of \$750 each
 - 2 CNC Pro Cook Bursaries of \$500 each

Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Prince George Yellowhead, this annual event will provide a unique opportunity for a selected group of young Canadians to come together to gain a better understanding and increased awareness of what Healthcare means to them today and in their future. Through hands on activities in medical training facilities as well as college and university laboratories, they will come away with a clearer understanding about what it means to be a health care



worker. Through meeting with current students, educators and professional workers, they will learn to appreciate what it takes to pursue their medical interests. Join us for 4 Days of actively experiencing the wide range of opportunities in the healthcare field.





Adventures in Tourism

Join Rotary Club of Kelowna Ogopogo for an exciting fun-filled week (end of March to beginning of April) and challenge your thoughts on what tourism can be! Participants will learn about a variety of tourism industries: golf, wine industry, adventure, ecotourism, cultural, hotel and restaurant management. Rotary Clubs from around Canada and even as far away as Scotland sponsored high school aged students to attend this event with great success.



Adventures at the Port of Prince Rupert

Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Prince Rupert and the Port of Prince Rupert, this is an exciting opportunity for high school students to experience first-hand, the inner workings of North America's fastest growing marine port. With its expansion, the demand for skilled workers has never been so high. Students will meet future employers, see the industry in action and learn of vast career opportunities available.

Adventures in Citizenship

Sponsored by the Rotary Club of Ottawa Each year the outstanding high school students are chosen from across Canada will spend four days in the Ottawa in a program designed to develop Canadian senior high students potential as leaders in their communities and in Canadian society. The program is an exceptional opportunity for the Adventurers to explore our identity, shared values, the implications of the freedoms we all enjoy, and our history of tolerance and the search for compromises to bridge our differences. The students are sponsored by Rotary Clubs in all ten provinces and three territories, and their travel costs are borne by the sponsoring clubs. The program was instituted by the Rotary Club of Ottawa in 1951. To date, over 10,000 students have participated in the program including past Governor General Adrienne Clarkson, the Right Honourable Joe Clark and the Honourable Edward Broadbent.



Adventures in Technology

This one day annual program, presented by Rotarians in their respective industries, runs in conjunction with the College of New Caledonia and School District 57. The goal of AIT is to have high school students exposed to different avenues of technologies such as Artificial Intelligence and Drones. This free program can accommodate 35 students.

- The Prince George Council of Seniors is a nonprofit society that operates several programs, services and events to enhance the lives of seniors in the Prince George area
- On behalf of PGCOS, our Club provides funding for meals and have volunteers help deliver over 60 meals on Easter, Thanksgiving and Christmas holidays to brighten the lives of those seniors who are lonely or have mobility issues.
- We contribute approximately \$1,000 for each event annually

Since 2007, with the support of people like Chris Gailus of Global News BC and the UNBC Timberwolves, Rotary HOOP-A-THON has raised more than \$560,000 throughout all of British Columbia.

Rotary HOOP-A-THON in Prince George raised \$12,000 in 2024 then an additional \$11,000 in 2025 for local scholarships, bursaries, community projects, youth sports, youth leadership, youth at risk and exchange student programs.
