The Rotary Employment Partnership had a strong presence at the 2017 District Conference in Red Deer. Wendy McDonald, Rotarian and Chief Operating Officer at Inclusion Alberta gave an informative and inspiring presentation on the importance of real work for real pay for people with developmental disabilities.

Wendy highlighted the success of the partnership and affirmed the life changing role that Rotarians have played in creating over 440 jobs for people with developmental disabilities in Alberta since 2001!

She also challenged Rotarians to get involved in the continued effort to reduce the 80% unemployment rate for people with intellectual disabilities by opening up job opportunities in their own businesses or organizations and by encouraging their personal and business contacts to do the same.

Brogan Thorsteinson also gave a powerful personal testimony on what her job with Stantec has meant to her...
